

Village Cross - ~~point~~ crowns the hill opposite the main entrance to the Church, where the Parish Almshouse once stood has always been known as "The Cross". "Up to Cross" was a familiar way of designating that particular spot. No ~~remains~~ monument remains but the name is still there. It is practically certain that every Devon. Cornwall village had its Cross in ancient times.

From there go by the upper road of the village - were a street then. Cottages on either side. The last house to pass was Challoboro Cottage, once a public house - "The Rising Sun" - more appropriate would have been "The Setting Sun" - later Village Post Office. Just beyond it, the road turning to the right was Plum-pool - a stagnant sheet of water. Following the road straight ahead by the cart track on its right came to the entrance of the Billing Green - that the old village green or Bawling Green, was probably of the parish - about $\frac{1}{2}$ acre.

Following public footpath, along the summit of the Ridge Downs came to edge of massive cliffs - Southern boundary to the right a ~~low~~ Westcombe or Wilcombe which is locally, wrongly called - shean flows across the beach marks the extreme limit of the Parish in that direction. This side of Aymer, almost as far as Challoboro, shean dividing the beach marks our boundary.
