PARISH COUNCIL

E.E.C. Surplus Supplies: The official instructions concerning the distribution of surplus E.E.C. butter and cheese have been very misleading and, so far, distribution in this area has been only through the W.R.V.S.. It is now hoped that the Parish Council will be able to obtain supplies for all those who are eligible i.e. not only those receiving Supplementary Benefit and Family Income Supplement but also all retired people receiving a DHSS Retirement Pension. The first supplies will be distributed from the W.I. Hall, Ringmore from 10 a.m. - 12 noon on Thursday 12 March. All those eligible should bring with them their DHSS Pension Books (or send the books with somebody who will collect supplies for them).

Electoral Roll: Through an extraordinary official error, the names of seventeen voters have been left off the electoral roll. In response to her complaint about this, the Clerk has received an assurance that each voter, whose name has been omitted from the list, will receive a letter of apology re-assuring them that they are nevertheless entitled to vote in any election after 1 March.

Annual Parish Meeting: The Annual Parish Meeting will be held at 7 p.m. on Tuesday 14-April. It is hoped that there will be a good attendance of members of the public.

Best Kept Village: The Council has decided that, in view of problems with the muddy footpaths and the fact that in a number of ways the village has become far more untidy recently, it would not be worthwhile to enter the "Best Kept Village Competition" this year. It is hoped that those responsible for the local eyesores will do their best to improve matters, so that it will not be too long before a worthwhile entry can again be made.

## ALFRED & MARGARET LOCKYER

In the report about Alf and Margaret it appears that some of the facts were incorrect. In the interest of accuracy and because these Newsletters are kept by the Historical Society as village records, here are corrections that have been supplied to us by Parishioners who have been in the village before Alf arrived.

Margaret came to live at the Vean in either 1958 or 1959 and was then called Mrs. Linacore. The Hood Crees were at the Journey's End at this time. Alfred arrived in the village between mid 1959 and mid 1960. The Clipstones had now taken over the J.E. and Alfred was with them. Early in 1962 Ayrmer View was being built. In July 1962 Margaret and her husband moved from the Vean to Ayrmer View. On August 12 1965 Margaret's husband died. She stayed on at Ayrmer View and married Alf on 16 September 1967. Alf stopped working at the J.E. for a short time but soon returned. Westbury was run by the Lockyers as a Nursing Home for some time. Alfred lived in Ringmore for about 27 years, over 20 at Ayrmer View.
