PARISH COUNCIL

Parish Clerk: The Parish Council is very sorry that its Clerk, Mrs. Sally Davis wishes to resign not later than April. Anyone who would care to take over this job should contact the Chairman, Mr. Ken Williams.

Lower Manor Farm: - The Council has received a Planning Application to change the barns at Lower Manor Farm into dwellings. There will be a Special Meeting of the Parish Council to discuss this on Tuesday 19 January at 7 p.m. and all those who are interested are invited to attend.

Newsletter: At the next ordinary meeting of the Parish Council, on 2 February, there will be a discussion of the Newsletter, which is under-written by the Council. Views on whether the Newsletter should continue in its present form, or any alternative suggestions, would be appreciated before the meeting.

Unoccupied Premises:- Residents, or owners of holiday homes, who intend to leave their premises unoccupied for more than a weekend, are advised to complete a record card for the police. Cards, which can be obtained from the Parish Clerk at Challaborough Cottage or from Kingsbridge Police Station, record details such as where a key can be obtained. P.C. Penrice will then keep a special eye on the house and will be in a better position to help if there are any problems.

South Hams Mobile Library:- From 11 January, the mobile library will visit Challaborough at 11.55 a.m. on alternate Mondays, in addition to the normal visits to Ringmore at 1.35 p.m.

Trees:- Ninety five free trees were obtained this year from the County Council, for planting by residents. In addition, fifteen oaks are to be planted by the Parish Council to commemorate the anniversary of the defeat of the Spanish Armada. The chestnut tree alongside the bus shelter is to be replaced - after the removal of the contaminated top soil.

Crash Helmets:- The Council has been asked to transmit a warning from the Police that action will be taken against anyone riding a motorcycle without a crash helmet.

Hinkley Nuclear Power Station:- The Parish Council has been asked to make a formal objection to the C.E.G.B.s application to build another nuclear power station - of a controversial American design - at Hinkley Point in Somerset. While several Counsellors were personally opposed to the building of further nuclear power stations, at least until some satisfactory way of dealing with radioactive waste has been found, the Council felt unable to put forward views on behalf of the Parish. ANZAC BISCUITS or MUNCHY CRUNCHIES.

- 2 cups coconut
- 2 cups rolled oats
- 2 cups S.R. flour
- 1 cup (or more) raw peanuts (roughly crushed with rolling pin)
- d cup sugar
- 1 lb margarine or butter
- 2 tbls golden syrup.

Mix all dry ingredients. Add melted margarine and syrup. Put spoonfuls of mixture onto ungreased oven tin. Bake in moderate oven until golden. Remove from tin when slightly warm.

Anzac biscuits were so called because they were sent to Australian and New Zealand troops during the First World War by the folks back home.

This recipe was given to me by Elizabeth Logan who has written 4 cook books, one which she signed, and gave to me, and at the same time this recipe - Since parsnips are now at their best, I thought perhaps it may be popular.

 3 oz margarine.
 1 lb of parsnips.
 4 oz chopped onion.
 4. 1 crushed garlic clove. 5. 1 tablesp. flour. 6. 1 teasp. curry powder. (cautious with the curry.) 7. 2 pints of hot beef stock. (I use any type of stock, or stock cubes.) 8. 1/4 pint cream (optional) and chopped chives -

Method:- Peel and dice parsnips. Put 2,3 & 4 with 1 cook slowly with lid on - avoid browning. After 10 mins 5 & 6 to take up fat. Gradually incorporate 7 - simmer until cooked. Liquidise, or sieve, return to pan, correct seasoning with salt and serve with croutons (optional). pepper - Garnish with 8.

Sometimes, if this soup is too thick, I use a little milk, or sour cream - I keep chopped chives in my deep freeze, but parsley is also very nice, floating on top of J.E.B. some cream.
