Brent Moor Protection Group

The Public Inquiry into the planning application to build a house and cottage on the site of the former Brent Moor house is now due to be held on Wednesday 31 May, Thursday 1 June and Friday 2 June at the Village Hall, South Brent at 10 a.m.

There will be a meeting of the Brent Moor Protection Group in the School Hall, South Brent, on Tuesday 16 May at 8 0'clock. We will be discussing our arrangements for the presentation of our case at the Inquiry.

The present situation is that the land has just been put on the market once again. An advertisement appeared in the Financial Times on April 15. The asking price has been slightly reduced - from £110 an acre to £80 an acre. The area is advertised as "a potential leisure and sporting estate". They say "any purchaser requiring some form of residential accommodation should apply for details of various accommodation which is known to be available for sale ... ".

Dartington Rural Archive

Summer outing Monday 26 June 6 p.m.

This summer, the Archive's annual outing takes rather a long view of local history by looking back over a hundred thousand years. We have arranged a special visit to the PENGELLY CAVE STUDIES CENTRE in Buckfastleigh. Don't worry - we are not going potholing, crawling or even bending and you don't need special clothing.

The caves were formed when, long ago, they lay beneath the water table, the river Dart being then level with the top of the hill where the parish church now stands. In the Joint Mitnor cave we shall see remains of animals like the rhinoceros and straight-tusked elephant now foreign to this country. Our visit will include a walk on Buckfastleigh Hill where we shall be guided by volunteer members of the Cave Studies Trust, headed by Mr. Wilfrid Joint. The whole tour will take about one and a half hours, and MEMBERS WILL BE EXPECTED TO PAY THE USUAL FEE OF £1 which goes towards the upkeep of the caves and the Trust's work.

PICNIC: if fine, we can eat our traditional picnic in a field by the church where there are wonderful views over the surrounding countryside. If wet, we suggest the local pub, the White Hart in Buckfastleigh.

TIME: Meet in the William Pengelly Cave Studies Centre at 6 p.m. We shall be shown round in two or more groups, so if you have to be a little late you can join the second group. <u>DIRECTIONS</u>: From the Dart Bridge over the A 38, take the left hand road towards Buckfastleigh. After 300 yards, past a house called Fairway, turn sharply right up a steep track, Russets Lane. The Centre is half way up the hill. Parking is limited, so share cars if you can.

Conclusion: The cost to non members would be £2 which includes membership of the Archive. If any non-members wish to go please contact Cliff Path beforehand.

Bird Watch

Cirl Buntings a Devon Bird??

Numbers of cirl bunting have declined considerably in the south and east of England over the last 20 years. In Devon, recent population estimates suggest that the current breeding population is between 100 and 150 pairs.

Earlier records suggest that the cirl bunting was once more widespread and more numerous. A survey undertaken during 1957-59 recorded breeding birds present in all south coast parishes from Dorset to the Cornwall border and along the lower reaches of all the principal rivers. Today, Devon holds over 90% of the British population of cirl buntings.

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
