#### PARISH COUNCIL

Planning. At its October meeting, the Parish Council considered no fewer than five planning applications. Four of these, namely the building of an additional flat over the shop at Gralanda, Challaborough; the addition of a conservatory at Kimberley; the building of an extension at Mandava and the replacement of the doors and windows at Wychwood, were accepted without reservations. The fifth application was for a new dwelling in the garden of Hayes Manor. After a site inspection, the Parish Council put forward comments regarding the density of housing in the immediate vicinity; the recent High Court ruling on new buildings in conservation Ares and the recommendation for only five new houses in Ringmore, during the period covered by the Modbury Plan - which number had already been reached. The Council stipulated that, if the District Council decided to grant Outline Planning Permission, it was essential that such permission should be only for a bungalow built into the hill and not for a split level dwelling.

Notwithstanding the objections put forward by the Parish Council, the developers of Site 1, The Orchard have been given retrospective planning permission, by the District Council, for

the building of a separate garage.

Upkeep of Churchyard. The Parish Council has increased its grant to the Parochial Church Council to £85 for 1989.

Mirror at St. Ann's Chapel. At the request of Bigbury Parish Council, the mirror at St. Ann's Chapel is to be replaced. Meanwhile, the Ringmore Council has asked for the vandalised mirror to be removed, because attempts to use it may be dangerous.

Parish Clerk. There were only two replies to the advertisement for a Parish Clerk in the Kingsbridge Gazette. One applicant lived in Kingsbridge and the other in Strete. Since it is essential that the Clerk should live in or near Ringmore, the post is still vacant. Mrs. Myra Eddy is filling the position admirably on a temporary basis, but is most anxious to relinquish it. Won't anybody please take on this job, as a service to the village?

Water Emergency. The Operations Director of South West Water Services Ltd. has asked the Parish Council to convey his gratitude to all parishioners for their help in saving water, during the drought.

#### ROYAL BRITISH LEGION

It is once again approaching the time of the year when we make a big effort to raise money for the Poppy Appeal. In the past the three parishes of Bigbury, Kingston and Ringmore have responded magnificently. Last year's total at £1158 was only £40 down on the all time high of £1199 in 1987. This respresents close to £1 per head of the three parishes population, compared to a national average of less than 20p per head. Last year's national appeal realised a total of £11,033,091 an all time high. However there are still some 7,500 war pensioners and war widow pensioners alive from World War I, and over a quarter of a million alive from World War II onwards, so the need for help from the Legion does not diminish, indeed rather the opposite as those in most need get more elderly and frail. Incidentally did you know that since 1969 590 Service personnel have been killed and 4,500 injured in peace keeping operations in Ulster.

"I was the driver of our tank, and we went into action about half past ten. It is almost impossible to describe what happened from then onwards; the terrific noise, burning tanks and lorries - shrapnel ringing on the side of the tank, it was like a nightmare. We were hit several times before armour piercing shells plugged the engine. She began to smoulder immediately, filling the turret with smoke. It all happened so quickly, we were out, running for it - a terrific explosion as the tank blew up in flames - down - more running - picked up by one of the "lights" and out of it. We helped another crew to get out of their tank. We got them all out and we all got away alright from our tank without injury. One of the lads had some shrapnel across his arm, but that was all.

Back at the "echelon" they were short of men and I was put second driver to one of the ammunition trucks. As the sun went down, the tanks came back for replenishing and we had very little sleep that night. Next morning the battle opened up again with terrifying ferocity. On the "ammo" track we kept dashing into action, avoiding shells right and left, lobbing off the cases to the tank that needed it, and a rush back. Our nerves were in pieces and it was days before some of us could hold a mess tin steady!"

That is an extract from a letter written to his parents in July 1942, by a young man of 21 who had been called up and was serving in a Tank Regiment in the Western Desert at the time of the fall of Tobruck. He was lucky and survived and now lives in the area; but many of his friends did not.
