PARISH COUNCIL

Finance: Parish Councils are required by law to have their accounts audited by a particular firm of auditors. With an annual precept of only about £650, the Ringmore parish accounts are necessarily very simple, yet the audit fee has risen, in two years, from £52 - 80 to £90 - 14. The Parish Council will be writing to the Chief Executive of the South Hams District Council to express its utter disquiet at this situation.

Watch-A-Box Scheme: Mrs. Pam Wilkins has agreed to take over from Mr. Brian McCabe, the daily duty of inspecting the Ringmore phone box.

Mirror at St. Ann's Chapel: The new mirror, that replaced the one which was vandalised, has disappeared - presumably in the recent gale. A request will be made for a further replacement.

Cookworthy Museum: As in previous years, the Parish Council has made a donation of £10 towards the upkeep of the museum at Kingsbridge.

Parish Road Cleaner: Since 1983, Mr. Tom Woodall has conscientiously kept the edges of our village lanes free from litter and mud. He has now retired and the Parish Council will be writing to thank him for the care he has taken of the village. We now need somebody to take over this work. It involves 5 hours work a week and is paid at the normal agricultural wage. Anyone interested in the job should contact Mr. Guy Eddy.

<u>Planning</u>: Detailed planning applications have been received, to build a bungalow in the garden of "Tosca" - where outline permission already exists - and to build a restaurant, with seating for 100, at Challacott. In connection with the former application, the Parish Council is concerned to ensure that no damage is done to the roadside trees, which are protected by Tree Preservation Orders. In the case of the latter, the concern is mainly with the additional traffic, through Ringmore village, which would be generated. Fallen Tree at Westbury: Residents will have noticed the huge tree stump opposite "Westbury", on the road out of Ringmore and may have wondered where it came from. The story is one of very prompt and helpful action, on behalf of the village. At about 12.45, on the Saturday of the last great gale, the Parish Council Chairman found the road completely blocked by a huge fallen tree stump. He appealed for help to Mr. Perraton, of Lower Manor Farm, who immediately left his lunch and brought his tractor to the scene. With the aid of Mr. Eddy and several other volunteers he had cleared the road completely by 2 p.m. Thanks are due to Mr. Perraton and all concerned.

Tree Planting: The District Council has now become interested in the desperate need to plant more and more trees, if the planet is to survive. As part of the British Trust for Conservation Volunteers' campaign to plant a million trees, they are asking to be notified of small areas in the countryside where landowners would agree to the planting of native trees. If you can suggest any suitable areas, please contact the Parish Council.

BIRD WATCH

King Charles the Second brought the first Canada geese to St. James's Park in London in the 1660's. A striking, attractive bird with a black and white head and neck, it soon proved popular with the owners of many parks and stately homes, who brought more birds into the country.

There are now more than 10,000 Canada geese living here. At nearly a metre long it is our biggest goose. It can often be seen feeding around lakes and ponds. Some farmers regard it as a pest because it sometimes eats their crops.

Our smallest owl was also originally a foreign visitor. Released into the wild by members of the Victorian nobility, who brought it over from Holland, the little owl is gradually spreading over the country. Although a fierce looking bird, with bright yellow eyes and a hooked beak, it spends much of its time hunting for slugs, beetles and earwigs. Only 20 centimetres high, it rarely catches anything bigger than a mouse.
