Planning. Restaurant Challacott.

Plans have been circulated to Bigbury Parish Council for their comments.

Tosca Bungalow. Parish Council are concerned over the position of the entrance and because of its location opposite the Church, council wish to see a slate roof instead of tiles, also to ensure no damage is done to the roadside trees.

Parish Roadsweeper. The Parish Council agreed to approach a resident of Bigbury to see if he is willing to carry out the task previously undertaken by Mr. Tom Woodall. We have now received a reply from Mr. Woodall which is quoted below.

Westbury Fallen Trees. The Highways department have been approached requesting that the large root opposite Westbury is removed as it is a potential danger to traffic. Enquiries are to be made to S.W.E.B. to ascertain what the constructions are opposite Westbury and on the Cliffpath between Challaborough and Bigbury on Sea.

# ROYAL BRITISH LEGION

Poppy Appeal 1989.

Once again a new high has been set for the three parishes of Bigbury, Kingston and Ringmore in their efforts for the Poppy Appeal. This year's total has reached £1219 - 03 thanks to a misplaced late donation, just topping last year's figure of £1158 - 79. This figure is all the more remarkable when you consider the number of other charity events that have encroached on the Royal British Legion fortnight. The Royal British Legion cannot alter its annual appeal dates, and it does seem less than charitable when other major charities infringe these dates.

The breakdown of the events that produced this figure are as follows.

An auction of memorabilia was held at The Journey's End Inn, Ringmore on Friday 4 November, by kind permission of Dick and Rosemary. Thanks to Viv Freeman assisted by Stan Brunskill, Fiona Batten and Pam Brunskill an impressive £166 - 65 was raised in what was undoubtedly a fun evening.

On Saturday 11 November a coffee morning was held at Sedgewell Sands, Bigbury-on-Sea by kind permission of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Smith. This was well attended and the raffles, cake stall and bring and buy stall raised a record £250 for the appeal.

Sunday morning at 10.45 on 12 November, saw a large gathering of parishioners at Bigbury Church for the Remembrance Service, conducted by Rev. Arthur Drowley. The Rector in his sermon spoke of the good news coming out of Eastern Europe, and it did seem that those we were remembering had not been sacrificed in vain. The spring like morning reflected a new hope for the future. The collection raised £127 - 42 another record.

The last major event was the annual Whist Drive at Ringmore W.I. Hall, organised by the Ladies Branch of the Legion and held on Monday 13 November. This raised together with a bring and buy a further £52 - 52.

Meantime during the previous ten days a dedicated band of collectors had been out and about knocking on doors, and they, together with the static boxes at pubs and some shops, raised an extraordinary £599 - 94.

All this adds up to an impressive £1219 - 03 from the three parishes with electoral rolls that add up to less than 1000 persons, a figure that will stand alongside any in the land. Thank you all for helping to ensure that those who need our help are not being forgotton.
