RUMANIAN RELIEF TRUST APPEAL

A letter of thanks has been received from Graham Townsend, administrator of the Trust, for all the goods which have been collected by the people of Kingston, Ringmore and district. A report of the activities of the Trust describes the heart breaking condition of the children in the orphanages and the indescribable, filthy and degrading conditions at their first visit last May. A second visit was made in August when in most cases conditions had improved remarkably.

A vast quantity of goods were taken over on the first visit including 3 tons of clothing, toys, milk powder and baby foods, 2 tons of oranges, also 5½ tons of pharmaceutical and medical equipment. A second delivery in August included blankets and clothing for the desperately poor who were too ill or whose circumstances rendered them unable to manage. A third delivery is planned for October.

There still remains a need to improve the situation and anyone interested in this and the long term plans of the Trust then a large S.A.E. should be sent to Graham Townsend, Administration Rumanian Relief Trust, 1 Limeberry Cottages, Plymouth Road, South Brent, TQ10 9HX.

In addition to the goods collected locally, donations totalling £200 have been received including £100 from Kingston Church which has been sent to the Rumanian Orphanage Trust. The remainder has been sent to the fund set up by the Rumanian Relief Trust to purchase wholesale supplies of medical equipment which can only be used for that purpose and will be conveyed by the Trust direct to the end user.

Thanks for the splendid response from Kingston and Ringmore to the appeal. Although this is now closed anyone interested in alleviation of the continuing plight of the Orphanage children and those in desperate need, they should contact Graham Townsend as above or Tel. No. 0364 72508.

ROYAL BRITISH LEGION

At the beginning of November the Royal British Legion will be once again staging its major fund raising events in the form of the annual Poppy Appeal. Some of our younger readers may wonder why this is still necessary after over 40 years without a major conflict. The fact is that over 4000 servicemen have been killed and over 16000 injured during the 70 so called "peacetime" conflicts since 1945. Add these to the 250000 service pensioners and widows from the two Great Wars, and the need for the Poppy Appeal is obvious. In fact, last year, over 100000 persons were helped in some form by the Royal British Legion. As a young R.A.F. pilot I took part in the Berlin Air Lift of 1948-49, and occasionally wondered what it was all about. Why should we concern ourselves with the fate of the West Berlin Germans, who, only a few years before, we had been at war with. This was especially so when I acted as a pall-bearer at the funeral of one of the 23 British aircrew who were killed in flying accidents during the Airlift. Just a few years ago I was introduced to two Germans who had been resident in West Berlin during those days, and they said how grateful they were for the Allied resistance to the Russian aggression at that time. I met those two Germans again. They were so happy at the events of this last year, when all the barriers to Eastern Europe came tumbling down. It made me realise that it had been worthwhile although it had taken 40 years to prove it. This is just one small illustration why the Royal British Legion will be raising money to help those who have suffered and will continue to do so as long as there is a need.

Last year's national appeal raised £11,978,810 which is an all time record and re-presents 21.40 per head of population throughout the United Kingdom. The South West Area was top of the list with 32.48 per head of population. Our three parishes of Bigbury, Kingston and Ringmore collected a new record total of £1244.03, which for our listed population of 1140 is an astonishing performance.

PARISH COUNCIL

Local Plans Review. Residents are reminded of the important meeting which is to be held in the W.I. Hall, at 7.30 p.m. on Tuesday, 9 October. This is an opportunity to influence the next "Modbury Plan" - as it affects Ringmore and Challaborough.

Telephone Kiosk. In spite of repeated requests, S.W.E.B. has still not installed lighting in the new telephone box (although the old red box is still brilliantly illuminated). Largely because of the lack of light, the new "vandal-proof" telephone box has already been vandalised twice.

Village Roads. The County Council is still promising to send workmen back to the village, to repair the damage caused by their "Tar and Chipping" team. The Parish Council has asked for the road edges to be cleared of mud and weeds before the winter, so that the drains will not become blocked when it rains. The work of the Parish Road Sweeper, who replaced Tom Woodall, is unsatisfactory and some system of supervision is required.

Trees. 159 trees have been ordered from the County Council for planting this winter, including a sweet chestnut to replace the tree outside the bus shelter, which was vandalised last year. The trees will be collected from Exeter in late December or early January and those who have ordered them will be notified of the date, when this is known, so that planting sites can be prepared. Those who have ordered trees are reminded of the need for careful planting and after-care - including watering, if there is a drought next summer.

PVC Windows in Old Post Office. The insertion of plastic windows in a listed building, without any planning application is contrary to rules laid down by the Department of the Environment. The District Council's solicitor is still considering what action should be taken about the windows in Ivy Cottage and the old Post Office. The Parish Council has written to ask for the matter to be expedited.

Plot 1, The Orchard. After all these years, problems over the old orchard are continuing. Patio doors and a balcony have appeared on the first floor of the house on Plot 1, contrary to the planning permission. The owners have been given until 10 October to put in a

"retrospective planning application", after which Enforcement Action to remove the balcony will be considered by the District Council.

Parish Council Contributions. At its last meeting, the Parish Council decided to make the following contributions:-

190 to the P.C.C. towards the up-keep of the churchyard.

£10 to the Cookworthy Museum.

£10 to the Bonfire Party, which is being organised by the Journey's End on Saturday 10 November - to which the whole village is invited.

It is hoped that all members will help with providing the refreshments.

HOME ON THE MUD

At this time of year more than two million birds come to this country to do just that, leaving their summer homes in the Arctic to spend the winter on our muddy estuaries.






