PARISH COUNCIL

Modbury Plan. A very well attended Parish Meeting, on 9 October, was addressed by Mr. Lee Bray of South Hams District Council, who is involved in the preparation of a new draft Modbury Plan. Thirty seven people were present, including a large contingent from Challaborough. Mr. Bray said that he hoped to publish the draft plan - covering developments in the Modbury area until 2001 - before Easter 1991. The draft would probably state a need for 2000 low-cost houses, to meet local needs. Of these, 250 already had planning permission.

The new Modbury Plan would emphasize environmental concerns and would pay particular attention to Conservation Areas. There would be no specific Dwelling Allowances within such areas.

The District Council saw no need for Plymouth to expand beyond its present boundaries and would oppose such expansion.

The need for more jobs for local people was recognised.

In spite of traffic problems, the district Council does not favour road widening, since they recognise that narrow lanes are a natural restraint on traffic.

There were a number of questions about Challaborough and a general wish for it to be specifically mentioned in the new Modbury Plan. However, Mr. Bray advised against this, because Challaborough might be seen as an anachronism in the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

Challaborough residents felt that their standard of living had deteriorated in recent years. They complained particularly about the state of the roads and they were promised that complex legal questions, concerning the ownership of the roads in Challaborough, were being investigated. In reply to a criticism of the effects of the previous Modbury Plan on Ringmore Village, Mr. Bray promised that, under the new plan, care would be taken to safeguard the few remaining open spaces in the village.

Other comments from residents concerned the impression that the District Council disregards the views of Parish Councils and the fact that the increasing number of holiday homes in Ringmore Village leaves fewer and fewer people willing to take part in village life. The meeting was asked whether there is a specific demand in Ringmore for low-cost houses for purchase - with a restruction on re-sale. (The Parish Council would be very glad to hear of anyone in need of such accommodation.)

<u>Telephone Kiosk</u>. It is almost unbelievable that the new telephone kiosk, which was installed at the beginning of September, still has no light, although an electricity supply has, at last, been connected. This situation is certainly not due to lack of pressure from the Parish Council.

It has been decided that several shrubs will be planted behind the new Kiosk, to mask its very ugly appearance.

Village Roads. A new, young road-sweeper has been appointed and the Parish Council hopes that he will soon improve the very untidy state of the village roads.

Trees. The Heritage Coast Service has promised to provide sturdy fencing for some of the trees, planted by the Parish Council several years ago, which have been damaged by animals getting through the existing fences.

Plot 1, The Orchard. The offending balcony has been removed from the new house on Plot 1 and there will not be a retrospective planning application for its re-instatement.

<u>Village Post Box</u>. Listed Building Consent has been given for the removal of the letter box from Ivy Cottage. However, the Post Office will not remove the box until a new one is in position, in the vicinity of the new Post Office.

Writing at Remembrance-tide this year I am very conscious

With relief we watched the easing of tension in Europe and the agreements upon arms reduction, and now, with alarm, we view the impasse in the Gulf. Sadly, this is not the only area in the world where we hear of "wars and rumours of wars".

Man's turbulent incapacity to live at peace with himself is something that Jesus understood very clearly. He has promised to return to this earth bringing order and judgement - leaving those of us who would serve Him with a greater sense of urgency over the spread of the Gospel as we live in the light of His promise on the one hand, and the output of the news media on the other.
