# PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH. Considerable interest was expressed in the idea that a neighbourhood watch scheme should start. This would make our area a safer place and improve our liaison with the police. It has been decided that at the beginning of the next Parish Council meeting on 7 January 1992 there will be an open meeting in order to consider the views of the Parish. We would need to identify potential "street watchers" and appoint someone to co-ordinate the scheme. If you are interested and cannot make the meeting contact Guy Eddy Tel. 810203 and let him know.

NEWSLETTER. This will be the last Newsletter produced by Stan Brunskill and his helpers after 7 years of effort. The Council expressed great appreciation for such excellent service which we have all benefited from. Rosemary Tate and Cll. Rob Batten have agreed to continue to run the Newsletter from January 1992 and we hope you will continue to give them your support.

BONFIRE. The Council agreed to contribute £20 to the Bonfire and expressed appreciation to all those involved in helping to make this event a success.

TREES. Several parishioners have agreed to plant trees on their land which will be delivered later this month!

CHRISTMAS TREE. The Council once again agreed to provide a Christmas Tree

which will lighten up the Village during the Christmas period.

CHURCH HALL. A parishioner had previously asked a question regarding the ownership of the Church Hall. It has now been reported that the Trust Deed under which the Church Hall is held is dated 24 April 1972 and supplements a Conveyance of 18 May 1908. Effectively this gives the responsibility for the management of the Church Hall to the Parochial Church Council under the custody of the Diocesan Board of Finance. Everyone is now enlightened!

Hams constituency and create new parliamentary areas. This would mean that the western part of the South Hams would become part of a new constituency including Plympton and Plymstock. The Council have strongly objected to this proposal as

we fear it would encourage an urban sprall into the South Hams.

YELLOW LINES. The Council has objected to a proposal to ban car parking between Ringmore Cross and the Journey's End. This proposal would inconvenience residents and inhibit access to the Inn. The Council would prefer a sign indicating that the lane was in regular use by farm and other large vehicles and advising visitors that nearby parking was available.

CARAVANS. It was reported that discussions are in hand between a Site owner and a local landowner regarding the possibility of providing alternative access to Challaborough. The Council will await the outcome of these discussions

before considering further action.

BURIAL GROUND. It is well known that the Churchyard does not have much space

left. Discussions are taking place to explore future arrangements.

PLANNING. The Council were pleased to hear that new regulations could speed up the planning process in future. If applications are not objected to by the Council and the Planning Officer it will not be necessary to wait for the next Committee.

Cross Park - approval has been given for a shop.

Hillside - the Council did not object to the new plans.

Mandava - a site inspection is awaited to consider the swimming pool

roof.

Channel View - approval has been given for the garage.

Nile Bar - the Council did not object to change of use.

CBHP Sales Area - the Council objected to this site obscuring access to the

Kilns.

AYRMER COVE. Council expressed the view that it was important to preserve the tranquility of Ayrmer Cove as far as possible and hoped that car parking on adjacent fields would be kept to a minimum. Efforts would be made to monitor the situation.

THE PUBLIC. The last two meetings were attended by 13 and 6 members of the public. Questions were asked, comments were made and the Councillors were seen to be accountable. The Council welcomes your support and attendance and looks forward to seeing you at the next meeting on 7 January 1992. John Tate.



# ROYAL BRITISH LEGION POPPY APPEAL 1991.

Yet again we have reached a new record figure for our three parishes of Bigbury, Kingston and Ringmore in our annual efforts on behalf of the Poppy appeal. The figure of £1495 - 04 handsomely tops last year's record total of £1318 - 94, which is a remarkable performance in a year of monetary difficulty. The breakdown of events that produced this figure is as follows.

An Auction of 'memorabilia' at the Journey's End Inn on Friday 1 November, by kind permission of Richard Sully the licensee, produced £283 - 10 to get the Appeal off to a good start. Auctioneer Viv Freeman assisted by Myra Eddy doing the paperwork, produced this satisfactory result to a fun evening.

On Saturday morning 9 November a remarkably successful Coffee Morning was held at Sedgewell Sands, Bigbury-on-Sea by kind permission of Jack and Jean Smith. Cake, Bring and Buy and Produce Stalls, plus three raffles raised a massive £314 - 36.

On Sunday morning at 10.50 a.m., the annual Remembrance Service was held at Kingston Church conducted by the Rev. Arthur Drowley. The Rector in his address spoke of how Remembrance Services have changed dramatically in the last few years. How we used to gather year after year and remember somberly and sadly. Now suddenly there is the thought and hope that the sacrifices were not in vain and that there is real hope of a lasting peace. The Legion Branch colours were paraded by Brian McCabe and Chris Freeman, and the collection raised £115.

The last event of the Appeal was a Whist Drive held in the W.I. Hall at Ringmore on Monday evening 11 November. This produced another £54 - 25 for the total. Special mention should be made of our collectors who usually remain anonymous. This year they have been collecting in the worst weather conditions that they have ever had to contend with. Yet between them Bertram and Edith Toms, Carol Walters, Pam Brunskill, Alice Mason, Chris Freeman and Eileen Randle have collected a remarkable £620 - 62. In all, their collecting boxes plus those at pubs, shops and clubs, raised a record £712 - 53.

Finally this figure of £1495 - 04 could not have been achieved without the generous hearted support of the residents of the three parishes. Our grateful thanks are extended to all who have helped to make this another outstandingly successful year, and ensuring that those who need our help are not being forgotten.
