

Christians say that Jesus was raised from the dead and is alive evermore - indeed, St.Paul reckoned that if this is not true, then the Christians are the most miserable of all men! " Oh well, " some say, " it is only a theory and doesn't make any practical difference"; but there is one enormous difference it can make and that's



in our attitude to death. It has come out very strongly in the last few days in comments on the early death of John Smith. If there is no hope beyond death, no risen Jesus, no loving God and Father, then it is no surprise when people speak pf 'waste', 'injustice', and 'anger' in the event of early death. If we only have eyes for this life, then anything that cuts it short seems to be without meaning - but if there is more, why then a whole new dimension of hope and purpose comes on to the scene.

It's not often nowadays that we are able to speak of a national figure's clear faith in Christ - but we can for John Smith. And that means that he did have another dimension to his life that went beyond the here and now. No, it doesn't take away the sadness and loss, but it does mean that there is more to come. For the Christian it means being with Christ, which St.Paul described as 'far better'! And for those who are left, that strange continuity which we call 'the communion of saints' - a daily living in the light and hope of eternity, in fellowship with those who have already 'moved on'.

Although we have been promised that this work will be done on a very gradual basis, there is a danger that the management of the wood for future generations will cause visual damage for many years to come.



MEMORIES OF RINGMORE, by Dorothea Carson Terry (nee Triggs)

I remember a Bertie Colwill of Lower Manor Farm drowning at Ayrmer as a boy after diving from the rocks there. He was found stood up under the water lying against the rocks with his head on his hands. He had been missing for several hours and two other village boys who were with him were too frightened to tell that he had dived and remained under water.

The older people in the village would tell the story of an unnamed man who was washed ashore at Ringmore and was found tightly held in the jaws of a St Bernard dog, they were both dead when found. The man was buried on the edge of the Ringmore Church Yard against the Kingston road and the St Bernard immediately opposite in the hedge below the schoolroom. The belief was the St Bernard had tried to save the man.


One sad day I can recall was when the news of two young Ringmore soldiers deaths in the Great War came at the same time. There was a large congregation in the road outside Cumberland Cottages with much crying going on. One of the young wives made widow was expecting a baby at the time. Any crisis in anyones life in the village in those days was very much felt by everyone who lived there. I sincerely wish that the care and understanding of that time were as much in evidence in the world today and Ringmore stands out in my memory as a marvellous example to follow.




