



A RINGMORE ART CLASS

Writing in early June, one is saddened to learn of the doubts expressed by headteachers concerning religion in our schools. For many years now the law has required that each day in school should include an act of worship. Recently the government has indicated that such worship should be predominantly Christian - reflecting the background of our national life. Now many headteachers are doubtful that they can 'deliver'. There is much uncertainty about belief among their staff and confusion in areas where ethnic minorities are involved.

So the secularisation of our society really breaks through for far too long we have assumed the children will hear all they
need about religion through their schools. In this matter, "back to
basics" will mean "back to parents". We must expect that ultimately
our schools will reflect ourselves - and our doubts. Is this how we
want it to be?

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

We would like to thank The South Hams Lion Club, especially Lion Ian Mackay for a wonderful day.






THE 1994 GORDON BENNETT TROPHY

Who was Gordon Bennett? A wealthy American motor car pioneer who donated a splendid cup to be awarded to the winner of annual motor car races held on the open roads of europe, beginning in 1900. The winner of the race of a particular year had the honour of holding the next race in his own country. Thus in 1903 the race was to be held in GB after the Englishman S F Edge won in 1902. This posed a difficulty because motor car racing on English roads has never been permitted but Ireland, keen to promote a sporting contest, passed a Bill allowing the 1903 race to be held south of The course was about 320 miles (4 laps of 80 miles) and the race This may account for Mercedes was won by Jenatzy driving a Mercedes. involvement to this day. That company became involved in reviving the "Gordon Bennett" 20 years ago and has supported it ever since. mileage is similar but run in timed stages. Unfortunately the giant racing cars of the early 1900's (there are a few survivors) are in museums or private collections thus the age limit of cars eligible has been lifted to 1930, ie, no cars younger than Dec 1930 are permitted to run. invited to drive a 1930 Irish owned Brooklands Riley, a stark 2 seater once owned and driven by band leader Billy Cotton in the early 1930's at Brooklands. The car at present has been de-tuned to run on commercial petrol and I found it a tractable yet exciting mount. Navigation around the course proved difficult, driving with one hand whilst solving the mysteries of the route book held in the other, but the weather was fine and the welcome warm everywhere. I rounded off my visit on a cultural note a heritage bus tour of Dublin visiting inter alia Trinity College where one sees the Book of Kells and if desired cricket on the campus. I travelled by Aerlingus to and from Bristol in a propeller powered machine travelling at the current sedate pace of 300 mph. Footnote for travellers; airport is now Atha Cliath and all new road signs have Gaelic lower case letters above the old familiar names which are in roman capitals. BILL WARNE

Up until 1983/84 there used to be the Exeter Diocesan monthly magazine which had a centre page insert for local church news. This and the notice board in the bus shelter were the only means of disseminating news. The Parish Council under the chairmanship of Mr Ken Williams were worried that news of discussions and decisions were not being passed on to the parishoners. The suggestion of a newsletter was thoroughly explored. We were fortunate in that Stan Brunskill, ably assisted by Pam, offered to produce a newsletter and the very first issue appeared in January 1985, with the following introductory paragraph.

"This, the first Ringmore Newsletter of recent times, as far as we are aware, will come to you, with a little luck, every month during 1985. Your Parish Council has agreed to cover the cost for 12 issues. We would welcome your suggestions, comments, small private advertisements and contributions for consideration to CLIFF PATH RINGMORE. We hope you will find the newsletter interesting and informative.

We think the newsletter has been a great success, and we are very grateful to Stan and Pam and their helpers, who kept producing it until the end of 1991. It was then taken on by Rosemary Tate and Rob Batten, who produced it for the next two years, when pressure of work forced them to give up. We have been very fortunate that Andrea Stanesby and Yvonne Sheppard have offered to carry on.

The Parish Council's involvement in the production has been one of giving financial help at the beginning of the year, and making good any shortfall at the end of the year. In addition the Parish Council acts as a recognised authority who would accept responsibility, should any legal action be threatened, which has happened once.

In order to fulfil its original purpose, it is essential that the newsletter be circulated as soon as possible after each meeting of the Parish Council. That is why, in order to meet demands from some quarters that the Newsletter be circulated at the beginning of each month, it has been necessary to move the Parish Council meetings from the first Tuesday to the penultimate Tuesday in each month.

We look forward to many more years of Parish Newsletter, which represents the very best of Parish involvment.
