

Native trees and bushes will again be available this year from the Heritage Coast Service for those who are willing to plant and care for them.

The types which are likely to be available are :-

Oak, ash, field maple, birch, willow, alder, wild cherry, lime, beech, sweet chestnut, hornbeam, whitebeam, guelder rose, hazel, hawthorn, blackthorn, dogwood, rowan, spindle, service tree.

Trees will not be ready until the end of the year, but meanwhile a representative of the Heritage Coast Service may wish to inspect the proposed planting site and offer advice on its suitability.



Our winter programme begins on 1st October and our weekly routine will be as follows:-







* LOCAL GOVERNMENT REVIEW

It was reported that a number of parishioners had attended local meetings arranged by South Hams District Council and Devon County Council.

After discussion and debate it was agreed by a majority that the Council would notify the Commissioner that it was still in favour of retaining completely the present two tier structure throughout the county but that it noted that this was not an option offered in the consultation document. Of the options offered, the council supported retaining the South Hams District Council and Devon County Council (without Plymouth).

* PLANNING

To note that the National Trust had agreed to site the agricultural farm building a little further from the lane.

MEMORIES OF RINGMORE, by Dorothea Carson Terry (nee Triggs) Area (263) was "Rock Cottage" in which were the Hunter family with a son. The adjacent cottage was occupied by Sam and Bessic Ryder who sold cream, butter and eggs. I believe they also had a smallholding. At (275) were two cottages and in one lived Philip and Emma Triggs and Steve Horswill and family in the other. Next to the church (318) was "Virginia Cottage" which I lived in after Farmer Moore moved out to live in the newly built "Higher Manor Farmhouse". "Virginia" was the old "Higher Manor Farmhouse". Brothers John and Albert Moore had lived in both houses.

Further down on the right the lane led into "Walnut Cottage". I also lived here. Further down the lane again on the right was "Well Cottage". Here lived a Mrs Bartlett with son Joe. Also at this spot there lived the Triggs family with children: Stanley, Fred, William, John, Nellie, Millie and Nora among them. Slightly further on the left was an old courtyard and barn called "Peter's Court" and people with a name pronounced "Pe-dell" who lived in the "Vean" had "Peter's Court" converted into a house. The "Pe-dells" left the "Vean" later to live in it. Before (or after) the "Pe-dells", a Plymouth tobacconist lived at the "Vean". His name was pronounced "Truan". Further down on the right after passing the Institute was a court area up from which were steps leading to two cottages, one of them occupied by Reg Davis' parents. On the left further down the turning to "Lower Farm" were two workmen's cottages. In one lived Sarah Ryder who had a son Dick. He lived in the "Rectory Lodge" by the Rectory and worked for the Hingeston-Randolphs, I think mainly as the gardener. At "Lower Manor Farm" lived the Browns with a son Leslie. Later the Colwills lived here.




