The WI Committee was elected in November and the names of members seem very familiar.


Planning - the Parish Council had no objection to the conversion of a further barn at South Langston but it opposed the building of two dwellings in the garden of The Rickle at Challaborough.


Lime Kiln

This year the Remembrance Service was held at All Hallows Church, Ringmore on


Could we match last year's wonderful Poppy Sunday 8th November. A full church provoking sermon on the theme 'A Just War or Just War'. A further £128.27p was







THE PARISH ROOM

At the beginning of this year the Parish play their part by respecting the hall as a Room Committee, which had lost one or community asset. two members at the end of 1997, was restored to a full complement and under the Work is not finished. There are plans to about the task of developing the work which was under way. A list of requirements was established and a successful request was made to vary the projects to be covered by the extant application for a Small Lottery enable two main changes. Firstly, the interior was to provide more space inside the hall by moving the division between the Memorial extension to provide a place where the men of the village could meet to play snooker among other activities. Secondly, the toilet area which encouraged only the briefest of visits, has been improved immensely. A porch has been added enclosing both the door to the toilet and the back door to the hall and the whole area has a new roof. The furniture has been replaced. hot water has been installed, a hot air hand drier has been provided and the room has been tiled.
