DECEMBER IN THE GARDEN

GARDENING TIPS FOR THE MONTH.



- A few chives or roots of mint potted up now and kept cool for a week or so will provide new young shoots for Christmas. Parsley is better left under cloches.
- Check tubers in store of dahlias, etc. Remove any infected tubers from healthy stock.
- Rake up and burn all rose leaves to prevent the spread of diseases on to next year's leaves. In mild winters, leaves may remain on the plants until January or even February, so if necessary clear up again.
- Check over dormant pelargoniums and fuchsias. Remove dead leaves, and give little water.
- Now is an excellent time for the preparation of new borders. Double-dig and leave the surface rough to be weathered. If the area was previously turfed, remove turf first and bury it under the bottom spit as you dig. Add manure if available. Coarse compost is excellent for lightening heavy soils, and so is grit.
- Undertake any pruning, shaping or thinning of old wood on shrub roses. Shorten tall floribunda roses a little, to prevent wind-rock in winter gales, their main pruning comes later, after the worst winter weather.
- Christmas roses and Iris unquicularis. Put down a few slug pellets too.
- · If you do need to mow in a mild season, choose dry, breezy, frost-free weather, rake and remove the clippings.
- Lift crowns of rhubarb and plant in a bucket for forcing in a warm, dark place. It can be done under greenhouse staging, in the cellar, or even in a broom cupboard.
- Keep off borders when the soil is too wet. When dryer, lightly fork between the crowns of herbaceous plants, but take care not to disturb the roots.
- · Lightly fork the soil around established roses to keep the soil surface open and alleviate any compaction which was caused by your feet when working on the rose beds during the summer.
- Pick flowers of winter jasmine, witch hazel, wintersweet, Viburnum farreri and V. turns, and berried sprigs of holly and skimmia.

O No He isn't...O Yes He is.

Advent Sunday, is December 3rd, there should be a trumpet call "Look out He is coming". I have told the story before of the little Nun alongside whom I trained for ordination in Oxford. She moved along serenely, legs invisible under her habit, almost as if on silent wheels. When we were asked to produce the opening for an Advent Sermon it was her contribution that stuck in the memory. She quietly glided to the front of the lecture theatre, and instead of her usual quiet and melodious voice she bellowed "WAKE UP!!!". The words that followed warned us all that we needed to wake up and tell the world that Jesus came once in revelation of who God is, and that he is going to come again, but next time in judgement.

Disappointingly the Rowan William's response to the John Humphries searching for God radio discussion did not make it clear that the way to find God is through belief in His Son. This is the essential difference between the Christian faith and all other religions. Jesus was, and is, the only example of God searching out for humankind and revealing himself in person to us. We may not be aware of his presence, and when told that he is active on the human stage we might say just like the pantomime characters "O no He isn't", despite the chorus that goes up from those who believe "Oh Yes He is"

Advent as well as Lent in some traditions [not my tradition, but I respect those who wish to follow it], is a time when there are no flowers in Church as a reminder to those entering the building that this is a time for solemn repentance and recognition of our sin. A time to remind ourselves that in the words of our niece that we are "miserable offenders"; this was the overriding sense of herself that was put upon her in one particular rather dour Service she attended. Thankfully she now knows that the emphasis is not on her miserableness but on her forgiveness. It is those open arms of Jesus welcoming us all as forgiven sinners that leads us to celebrate his birth.

The call comes every year, a reminder that Christmas is not about shopping and spending. We hope that a glimpse of the better eternity will be with all our friends as we remember Jesus who stepped out of eternity into the times and trials of this world. He came on the ultimate rescue mission that none of us fully understand. Fully God, yet vulnerable as a baby wrapped in swaddling clothes! Fully man, yet without the taint of sin and selfishness that afflicts all of us. It is some message! A very good reason to celebrate and give thanks. We wish you a really wonderful and joyful Christmas, and a New Year full of wholeness and peace.

S.O.S Healthy Eating for Christmas

With thanks to Dr Mark Vanderpump, Consultant Physician specialising in Endocrinology and Diabetes at the Royal Free Hospital in London, for the following:

The truth is after decades of research we do not know who should eat what or when. Are three meals a day healthier than one? Is fat bad if weight is normal? Is a balanced diet best? Should we eat 3, 5, 7 or 9 fruits per day? The latter was one recommendation for men but recent studies have found no benefit beyond 3.

The traditional answers to these questions is yes and the more fruit the better but the evidence is far from complete. Not just because few scientific studies have confirmed the benefit but because of complex interactions between eating and health and all diets have unintended consequences. An example of such an interaction is that a protective antioxidant in dark chocolate is removed by taking milk at the same time. Whilst obesity is a growing epidemic and costs health services as much as smoking and incidence of diabetes also increasing with the prevalence within the UK as high as 3%, past advice provided to the public has not changed eating habits in large sections of the population.

It would therefore appear sensible at Christmas to focus on maintaining your waist circumference to less than 37 inches in men and less than 31 inches in women, eating oily fish and nuts including walnuts, use fruit to add sweetness rather than sugar and enjoy moderate alcohol use, with alcohol taken regularly not in binges.


Guy said he was completely surprised by the presentation, but it did not take long for his gift to be put to good use.


