#### New laws for dog fouling

Dog owners who allow their pets to foul the public footpaths should be aware that the local dog warden is keeping an eye on the situation by delegating their powers to named volunteers within South Hams villages. Anyone identified allowing their dog to foul the footpaths may be prosecuted under the new local council powers and dog wardens and village volunteers alike have the power to issue on-the-spot fines of £50 to offenders where there is sufficient evidence. Wardens of overt fouling (as these volunteers will be called) will be supplied a digital camera to catch offenders and a ruler to measure distances in cases of dispute from verge to footpath. If you would like to become a WOOF further details will be supplied.

# A BIG SURPRISE

We used to meet, ready to go to away Rugby matches, outside Charles Street Police Station in Leicester. Every other Saturday morning in Autumn, Winter and early Spring we were there. One day Keith got there early and was the only witness to a road traffic accident. Being a good citizen he gave his name and address, and away we went, not coming home until the midnight hours after the game. Keith returned to a very distressed mother. At around 8.00 p.m. that night she had answered the door to the proverbial burly copper in uniform who had asked "Is this where Keith Spittle lives?". Needless to say she feared the worst, not just potential arrest, but the "I'm afraid to tell you he has been involved in an accident etc". His Mum had never been happier to see her son alive and well.

It was more dramatic for those who not just seen an officer at the door and thought the worst. They had seen the worst. Their friend Jesus had been whipped, tortured, crucified and stabbed with a Roman lance to be sure he died before the Sabbath. It was he who turned up first in the garden, and then in the sitting room. Thomas, for ever after called "Doubting Thomas", could not believe it when he was told: and even Mary Magdalene face to face with Jesus struggled with the reality of his coming back to life. So do many of us, and yet we do need to look at the evidence. Just like my friend Keith and his witness statement which helped the police with an independent observers view. There was more than one witness statement of the resurrection of Jesus, in fact there were 500 witnesses. Four of them wrote books about it! Also the easiest way for the Romans and Jews to finish this troublesome thing called Christianity was by producing the dead body – they couldn't!

### The I April speef.

An ongoing question for Ringmorians has been the question of the origin of the name of the inn. That it had nothing to do with the playwright R.S. Sheriff is now generally accepted. Recent research seems to have produced a definitive answer. It has to do with the Pountney family. The Pountneys either came with the Conquest or were Flemish merchants who settled in England during the late 14th century. Either way by the middle of the 16th century they had acquired great wealth and much land in Devon and are believed to have lived in a Pountney manor, now disappeared. As Catholics they felt it politic to move to Ireland though retaining some land on the remoter Moor, and in Ireland they invested in building a fortune in the linen trade and in land. At some point they converted to Protestnantism.

There is now a gap in our knowledge of the family until the late nineteenth century. A poor cadet branch seems to have returned to Devon to a rough holding on the southern part of the Moor. They continually petitioned to reclaims rights to iron mining which they said had been illegally confiscated during the Cromwellian period. One Arthur Pountney who claimed to have a science degree from Durham University petitioned between 1891 and 1907 to Prime Ministers Gladstone, Salisbury and Campbell-Bannerman. Nothing came of these claims. But Arthur was in luck! He received a communication from a distant relative in Ireland: a very rich man of over 80. This Pountney

had married into a wealthy Dublin family called Rill who made money from the Dublin-Buenos-Aires trade in cattle and lately chilled beef. The old man was without sons and Arthur Pountney was his nearest male relative. He left all his money to Arthur provided that he would take the hyphenated surname from the Pountneys and his Dublin family: that is Pountney-Rill. Arthur in his early twenties had dabbled in horse-drawn charabancs and after the First World War became impressed with the early motorised charabanc service run by the Greenslade brothers out of Bradninch (near Exeter). So Arthur (now Arthur Pountney-Rill) acquired a second hard charabanc 24-seater, Ford engined and with a Dennis chassis which had been commandeered for troops during the War. He used it for trips from Ivybridge to Plymouth but customers demanded seaside visits. So he began Sunday excursions from Ivybridge to Bigbury village whence passengers walked to the beach. But they wearied of walking up the hill. Therefore Arthur arranged trips to Ringmore. He advertised them as "Beach, Blossom and Beverage". The first was due on March 25th, 1921 but had to be postponed because of flooding near Modbury. So the first journey took place on the following Sunday. Amidst much excitement from villagers and travellers, the charabanc arrived outside All Hallows. It could only take fifteen passengers because of the hill up to Harraton Cross and even then sometimes adults had to get off and push. On Sundays when the vehicle arrived. Arthur would announce: "This is it, folks, your journey's end : either for the inn or the beach". So, though his catchphrase was not immediately adopted, many are now convinced that that FIRST journey by A.P-RILL'S CHARABANCS (As Arthur called them) was a defining moment in the history of the Inn.

### Tyntesfield's Interiors: The battle of the sexes

Tyntesfield is a very complete Victorian Gothic mansion and estate on the outskirts of Bristol and was saved for the nation by the National Trust, with private donations and an enormous Heritage Lottery grant in 2003.

This lecture is given by Emma Cowan who is currently writing her PhD entitled - "This opulence of comfort": The Symbolism of Tyntesfield's nineteenth-century interiors.

The lecture will be based on her current research and focuses on the proposition that mid-Victorian interior spaces were gender-specific. The location, layout, furnishing and decoration of rooms at Tyntesfield offer an excellent example of this.

# **News from All Hallows**

#### Sundial Update

Repair of the Slate Sundial by McNeilage Conservation in Talaton Exeter is proceeding now that it has had time to dry out. Unfortunately upon detailed investigation in the workshop it is found to be in a much worse state than originally thought than when initially inspected in 2003. The rear slate backing is showing signs of severe laminations and will therefore require a slate frame to be fitted around the perimeter of the sundial to insure its future integrity. The existing Iron gnomon has rusted away considerably over the past couple of years to render it impossible for renovation. It will therefore be replaced by a stainless steel one which of course will last for a considerable length of time. All this extra work has delayed the return of the restored sundial until April and of course has resulted in an increase in the cost. I have received some very welcome donations towards the original £1,850 restoration costs and any other contributions will be greatly appreciated. #### Who is the Easter Hare?

Originally the Easter have was the sacred companion of the Anglo-Saxon goddess Eostre, whose festival was in Spring.

This is how the hare was associated with Easter. Parents told their children that the magic hare would run through the night and bring them presents. So now in many places children prepare little nests in the garden, ready for the Easter hare to put in her eggs.

In some countries, people confused the hares with rabbits, and that is why the Easter rabbit has completely taken over from the original hare.

Isn't it strange that the hare brings the eggs when it's birds who lay them?

#### All about Easter Eggs

Since the Middle Ages people have been decorating eggs for Easter gifts. The eggs were either hard boiled or blown.

Decorating eggs, rolling eggs and knocking eggs are all popular customs practiced in many parts of the world.

In Greece the eggs are dyed in many colours. Everyone carries an egg with them, and when two people meet they knock eggs together saying 'Christ is risen'. No one is really sad to break an egg because the children say, 'The crack in the egg lets a blessing escape'.

In Yugoslavia they marked their eggs with the letters XV which stood for Christos Vakrese or Christ is risen.

Did you know that the Sepick crocodile lays oblong eggs with white yolks?

1.	Grease two baking sheets
1. 2. 3. 4. 5. 6. 7.	Cream together the butter and sugar until pale and fluffy and beat in the egg yolk. Sift the flour with the spices and fold into the creamed mixture, with the fruit and peel. Add enough milk or brandy to give a fairly stiff dough. Knead lightly on a floured surface and roll out to about 5mm thick. Cut into rounds using a 2° cutter. Place on the baking sheets and bake in the oven at 200c/400f mark 6 for about 10 minutes. Remove from the oven, brush with beaten egg white and sprinkle lightly with caster sugar. Return to the oven for a further 10 minutes or until golden brown.

#### Chocolate nests

Melt 6oz chocolate together with 1.5oz butter in a large bowl. Stir well and crumble in enough shredded wheat to make a stiff mixture. Place dollops into cake cases and place 3 mini chocolate eggs on each. Ideal for the little ones to make and everyone to enjoy!
