GARDENING FOR MAY

GARDEN

Weed control by hoeing and spraying etc.

Control slugs and snails.

Mulch heathers.

Encourage bushy growth on fuchsias by nipping out tips.

Trim conifers and evergreen hedges.

Put in supports for tall herbaceous perennials.

Pinch out side shoots and tendrils from cordon grown sweet peas.

Lift spring bedding and prepare for planting summer bedding. Bulbs can be used elsewhere Harden off bedding plants protect from frost.

Plant up hanging baskets.

Shade greenhouse structures.

Prune Kerria, Forsythia and flowering currants

Plant out Dahlia tubers in prepared plots

Sow hardy annuals in situ

Deadhead flowers of finished Rhododendron

Spray roses for Black spot, mildew, aphids etc.

LAWN

Edge lawn fortnightly (i.e. every two weeks), using long handled shears.

Sow grass seed on newly prepared lawns.

Mow when necessary, gradually bringing the height of cut lower.

Best month for using a selective weed killer or lawn sand.

Brush or rake to lift coarse grasses before mowing.

VEGETABLES

Plant out Brussels Sprouts, summer and winter cabbage.

Sow in pots sweet corn, runner beans, French beans, for planting out in June.

Sow cucumber, marrow, and melons in gentle heat.

Sow short rows of lettuce fortnightly.

Transplant pencil thick leeks into final position.

Control slugs and snails.

The council is therefore short of four members. Procedure for co-option is referred to elsewhere in the Newsletter.

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

Fields like soft edged patchwork Sketched on shot silk canvasses. A boundless panorama With changing hue and pattern As the weather twirls her skirts.



Gulls hold back their haunting cry As they glide and thermal play Over sun - white cottages. Then sea views shine sunset fire And stars bejewel velvet skies.



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
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FAREWELL



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LAPLAND DOGSLED SAFARI - MARCH 2007

Our recent week's adventure in the Arctic wilderness was so unusual we thought you might enjoy this brief account. The first day was taken up journeying to Heathrow, then to Stockholm and a further flight to Kiruna, north of the Arctic Circle where we met our tour leader and 8 others of our group. It was only a short ride on to our first cabin in deep snow for 4 of us in bunk beds. A good breakfast the next morning and the excitement began as we were introduced to our husky team, (4 dogs each) and our sleds were loaded with our luggage, a reindeer skin and box of food & thermos of drink for lunches or snacks on the move. Our warm clothing was supplemented with all-in-one suits, lined snow boots, hats and gloves. Now we had to take each of our wildly keen husky dogs from kennel to the lined-up tied-to-tree sleds and learn how to harness and attach them - you can imagine the noise of 44 dogs anticipating the trip! We were divided into 2 teams, with an experienced leader and shown the runners of the sled to stand on and the 3 methods of braking- the gentle brake, the forceful brake and anchor brake for use when stationary. The rules seemed to be- stay in line, hang on, remember you have a brake and above all, don't lose your dogs—and we were off on the command "haik, haik" or something similar, (not mush, mush)! The way those dogs fell silent and swung into action and pounded along the trails was remarkable - for huskies a skill inbred. We travelled in sunshine along the frozen Torne river valley - pristine white fields with lines of snow - laden spruce trees- which formed the border between Sweden and Finland, and we were quite awed with the magic scene. We wound our way to the next lodge, home for 2 nights in a cabin for 5 with wood burning stove, gas ring, sink, with toilet facilities somewhere outside in the snowl But first, before our own hot drink we needed to unharness our team and clip them at intervals along steel lines secured between trees where they had their meal, (frozen chopped tripe with hot water) after which they settled down in the snow just a few were indulged at night with blue jackets. Before sleep one or two dogs would begin barking, then a howling chorus was set up - it became a memorable unearthly sound.

Now "experienced" sledders (1) we set off next day on a longer circular trip - but we'd been up early (0745) with the dogs, feeding and cleaning up before our breakfast, (porridge, coffee or tea, bread with ham and cheese or lingonberry or cloudberry jams). It was a bonus for the dogs to have lighter loads as our main baggage remained in camp, so we sped along forest paths, again enjoying sunshine (still -10 degrees). Our leader had a snowmobile so could lead the way or circle back to check all was well with everyone - and there were possible hazards! Eg, sleds could overturn in deep snow together with its driver, so it had to be a combined struggle for human and dogs to right everything and catch up again. Meanwhile the sleds behind had to halt and dogs could kick over their traces and had to be disentangled before moving on. The dogs were all human friendly but given an opportunity could easily pick a quarrel with their neighbour! A bad fight did occur on one occasion but thankfully, disaster was just averted. You learnt to tie up your lead dogs to the next sled to keep your dogs in order when it was an official stop. There was one occasion due to ice on the sled runners when Drina's legs flew off as we rounded a corner and she just managed to hang on with her hands, tobogganing for a couple of minutes before another incident ahead brought us all to a natural stop! The golden rule of "don't lose your dogs" was nearly broken! Again, the dogs are so keen to run we saw times when people were caught off guard and had to run along the track in an effort to catch their team - not easy in slippery snow. We realised the dogs had their limits though when one dog collapsed while running and was unharnessed, given food to replace energy and then placed in one of the sleds to continue the journey as a passenger. However, what was amazing really was that all small happenings were resolved happily without injury, we only remember one grazed face needing an elastoplast after brushing past a tree branch.

A picnic stop just off the trail was a luxury - we all set to, wood was quickly gathered and a fire made, then we sat on snow banks with our warm reindeer skins beneath us enjoying food and drink and swapping experiences, - we were a very content, friendly group appreciating this chance of travelling by husky in the beautiful expanse of frozen Arctic wilderness.

The next day was the long testing one - 3 sessions of 2 hours travel, also, the weather was grey with wind chill of driving snow. We could imagine how trails could get covered and poor visibility hide the markers so paid extra attention and drew our scarves closer. It was important too to have handy snacks on the move to keep warm and energised. The dogs also had pieces of meat along the way to help sustain them. ... Cont'd

It felt a real achievement to ride in before dark to our wildest camp in Sami country - these people are the original inhabitants traditionally herding reindeer and number about 17,000 in Sweden. We were intrigued to be assigned a fishing ARC for accommodation. Basically it's a canvas tent on a wooden base with a raised metal bench taking up half the space. That is where we slept, on our reindeer skins, in sleeping bags with all our clothes on! However, a small paraffin stove in the corner provided some warmth. In the floor was a trap door used when fishing through a hole in the ice. Facilities (limited) were a long way down the "garden". Although sounding a bit rough we preferred it to the alternative of sleeping on slatted table tops in the cabin. What else did we expect of a wilderness camp? As usual our dogs were staked out nearby in their snowbeds.

Once more packed up we moved off eastwards, a bit tired and stiff, towards Soppero village, staying at a Sami lodge with a large attractive living room and an upstairs (via a steep ladder) for sleeping, (dormitory style). We enjoyed a meal of reindeer with a glass of wine and coffee then heard about Sami life - the host family were the first generation not nomadic but we were shown all the equipment the grandparents and family used to move around with their reindeer for pasture. Then it was a last care of our dogs and farewell to them before they were "posted" into boxes for travel home on the trailer with our sleds roped on top. What great characters they'd been - we can't thank them enough for their willing, patient efforts. We miss them already and of course, our hard working human leaders. Then it was back in the minibus - stopping en route to Kiruna at Jukhasjarvi to visit the famous Icehotel with its Icebar. We didn't stay in an Ice room after all, hadn't we experienced similar already? We were pleased to see a lovely bride and attendant walk up the snowy path to be married in the Ice church, to be greeted at the door by the lady Minister, warmly hatted and cloaked. We had a last group meal out at Kiruna then a sleep at a hotel (luxuryl) before the journey home. It was all a necessary wind down from our unique, hands-on, dog orientated 4 day experience in that unforgettable, hard-living, beautiful quiet Arctic land,- how privileged we feel and grateful to have survived to tell the tale!
