

# A MUSICAL JOURNEY of selected archive recordings of pieces

Many readers will know that Shaun composed a series of compositions inspired by the beauty and history of the locality recorded on tape under the title of 'Sound Pictures of the South Hams'. Some will also remember attending the musical evening in late December last year at Scypen when he and his family entertained us with some more of his compositions. Recently he gave a similar evening of entertainment performed at the magnificent concert hall at Port Regis School where he is musical director. He is actively promoting his music now and has recorded a number of his compositions under the title of a 'Musical Journey' on a c.d. that he successfully had for sale that evening. The 12 tracks on the c.d. contain a varied range of music. For example the first 'Shaun's Piece of Old Cloth" is a ragtime piano solo whilst 'From Tragedy to Hope' is a recording of a live performance at Bologna of his international prize winning entry, a piece for violin solo and orchestra. 'Independence day is a joyous, reflective and sometimes passionate cello and piano duet written for a friend who married on the 4<sup>th</sup> July and 'North America' is a piece for large choir and orchestra tracing the history of jazz music from Negro spirituals, through blues and ragtime to Big Band music of the 1940's. 'Chained Freedom', written for Iraqi musician Waseem Faris, with whom Shaun worked for eight years, is a personal reflection on the effect of Saddam Hussein's regime and the Iraq war.

God is calling you and me on an adventure of faith. We are nearly at the end of the season of Lent when we take time to focus on God's call. I have been using a challenging booklet by the Church Mission Society called "40 days of Yes" – the very first days reading was this:

"When your ship, long moored in the harbour, gives the illusion of being a house; When your ship begins to put down roots in the stagnant water by the quay; Put out to sea!

Save your boat's journeying soul and your own pilgrim soul, cost what it may." Pilgrim by Dom Helder Camara

We easily settle down into safe comfortable lives where repetition becomes habit and we find ourselves living on autopilot in a direction decided, or maybe just slipped into, long ago. God calls us from here to heaven; and some people down through the ages have heard that call and said "Yes". Disciples heard the call of Jesus and said "Yes", but sometimes it changed to "No". Peter denied Jesus on the eve of the cross, but he heard the call again and his "No" changed to "Yes!"

As we continue in the way of faith so we become more sensitive to God's calling and seek his direction in our lives. At the end of this month Sunday 25<sup>th</sup> April is "Vocation Sunday" – literally "Calling Sunday", where our focus will be on listening to who, what and where God wants us to be. Easter helps us to appreciate the cost of our salvation and we find courage to face the cost of discipleship.

This challenging prayer was given for the first day of "Forty days of Yes" -make it your own and come to church on 25th April to say "Yes!":

Father, lead me deeper in my journey with you Cost what it may. By your grace may I be prepared to put out to sea, To leave the safety of the harbour and to follow your call Cost what it may. Amen.

Rosemary had to leave before the end of the second conference in order to fly to Germany where she had been asked to run a course on the healing ministry of Jesus for the Armed Forces Christian Union. Rosemary had a great time! On her return though she did say how very good it was to be back in Ringmore.


# J.E.B.J.E.T.T.T.

Sunday the 21st March 2010 saw a crowded conservatory in the Journeys End to participate in and watch the 14th Annual table tennis tournament. Once again the magical and easily organised number of 32 players entered albeit with a bit of coercion from the writer and a three line whip from Juliet. The draw took place, under scrutiny, at the J.E. on the previous Thursday and was not altered. With one exception all the players turned up on the day that started at 1-30 p.m. To a little concern of the organisers, the first round took rather longer to play than expected because there were some very close games, played to the best of three games, each match scored up to 11 points. 



#### STAN AND PAM CONTINUE ALONG THE SOUTH WEST WAY

Fortified by the wine we pressed on, past lovely Mattiscombe beach and climbed to Start Point. We treated ourselves to an ice cream at the Trants Hotel. Hallsands.

At Beesands, by chance, we met old friends from Birmingham who were staying in a caravan and were just about to leave for home. We managed to beat the tide and walked along the beach to Torcross, then on to Stoke Fleming where we stayed the night at a campsite. Stoke Fleming to Dartmouth to buy Stan a new hat. He had left it in the pub, and we started too early to collect.

We crossed to Kingswear by ferry and found our way to where the Carlisle's lived overlooking the Dart. (They used to live in Ringmore.) We had coffee and a chat then walked the 5 mile new coastal path to Brixham. Although beautiful the path was quite gruelling & exhausting. We passed through an area dedicated to the memory of Col. H. Jones.

We don't do any particular training but rely on not overdoing things for the first few days: but my muscle started to ache and was glad when we reached Brixham. We had to climb a steep boulder strewn track to reach a farm. The farmer warned us that the sheep shearers were coming and we would have to camp in an outlying field. We were taken there in the farmer's 'buggy.' The site was next to a side road. I was in the tent out of sight. A gentleman in a very smart car stopped and asked Stan if he was lonely and made a proposition! He then spotted me and made an excuse that he had lost his way and drove off. We had a dehydrated meal in the tent that night as it was too far to the pub. The next morning we walked back to the farm just as the shearers arrived. Surprise surprise out of the van stepped Jonathan Stainsby from Ringmore. (of Fathers4Justice fame.) Stan found the hat he had left in the pub in the bottom of his haversack. So now he had two hats, and grumbled all day about the extra weight he was carrying. (Men!)

The next two days eventually brought us to Dawish Warren. Through Torbay. Lovely spots such as Ansteys Cove & Shaldon, very interesting. Another ferry crossing to Teignmouth. The Warren itself is a nature reserve.

On to Starcross walking between the railway line and the river. Starcross Sailing Club is the oldest in Britain. I.K. Brunels unsuccessful Atmospheric Railway ran alongside. A pumping station can still be seen at Starcross. Something to think about as we tramped the 3½ miles to Starcross ferry and crossed to Exmouth. We decided to explore Exmouth and tried to leave our haversacks at the police station. They would not allow this because they may have contained explosives! (I.R.A.) Another 3½ miles, mid morning found us sunbathing on Budleigh Salterton beach. A lovely quiet place so clean and no litter. The painting by Millais 'The Boyhood of Raleigh' has part of the sea wall as a setting. Raleigh was born nearby at Hays Barton. We walked inland to cross the River Otter, through a nature reserve. Then on to Ladram Bay with its 2 famous Red Pillars where we spent the night at a camp site. A couple in a trailer tent made us a cup of tea. Very kind of them. I think they felt sorry for us. (We were 'proper camping' not living it up in a trailer tent!)

#### GOING FOR GRANITE ....

On a glorious, crisp, sunny March morning, James Parkin, Mike Wynne-Powell and Ann and John Bracey joined John and Chris Grimshaw at the Sibelco Lee Moor quarry to select boulders for the Ringmore Parish Boundary Project.



Safely kitted out with helmets and fluorescent waistcoats, we squeezed into a four-wheel drive and set out across the eerie white landscape of the kaolin quarries. We could have been visiting another planet, except for encounters with an occasional sheep and a scavenging fox.

Diggers and trucks looking like Dinky Toys could be seen beavering away in the vast quarry landscape, with



the occasional huge truck passing us on the road and reminding us of the true scale of the workings. Jim, our driver, enlivened our journey with informative snippets about the kaolin industry.

Sighting huge boulders in a hollow by the road, we stopped and clambered down to inspect them. John Grimshaw used his pole with its metre marking to see if these boulders met the agreed two-cubic-metre requirement, but our hopes were dashed by Jim, who pointed out that most of them were kaolin based and would gradually erode. However, we marked a few all-granite ones and then travelled on to other sites, gradually selecting more suitable boulders.

The last site was a treasure trove of boulders. Possible ones were enthusiastically chosen, with various positions in mind: lichen-covered ones for sites on National Trust land and flat ones for clapper bridges. Mike photographed them from different angles to help John pick out those that were most fit for purpose. Fortunately, all the stones for Ringmore can come from just one site at Lee Moor and this will make the operations of loading and delivery much simpler than they might have been.

We returned home quite weary, but with a much clearer insight into a project that will make our lovely Ringmore parish walks even more interesting and thought-provoking.



#### OPEN SESSION

Parish Council were asked if a skip could also be provided for Challaborough – this was agreed, date to be arranged. The skip for Ringmore (24<sup>th</sup> April) will be from 10.00am – 4.00pm. If parishioners are unable to depose of unwanted items they may contact a member of the council and help will be organised.

It was reported that the coastal path from Challaborough to Tobys Point at the top of the new steps was starting to subside. Cllr. Lambell stated that he had contacted Peter Guy regarding this matter.

#### MINUTES OF LAST MEETING

Item under 'Any other business' the price of oil - should have read it is now 1.4p.p.l lower than Boilerjuice's lowest price for 1000 litres. The minutes were then signed.

#### MATTERS ARISING

Village Diary – The Chairman reported that there were two Ringmore websites, one of which is a very old site and is out of date and the <u>www.ringmore.info</u> site is not updated on a regular basis. Unless someone is willing and has the time to start a Ringmore parish diary we can only rely on the newsletter.

Hope Cove Coastguard Rescue Boat – The Chairman attended a consultation meeting at Kingsbridge School which was represented by only one member of MCA Management. The impression given was that the MCA had already reached a decision to withdraw this service. A memo will be sent to our local MP strongly expressing our views to reinstate the rescue boat.

#### W.MUMFORD

The implementation of Exeter as a unitary authority is still going ahead, however there is a judicial enquiry in April. If this fails it is likely that the authority will be in place by May 2011. This may change as a result of the general election. High-ways have been very busy on the roads as the severe winter weather has caused serious damage with large potholes. This is ongoing and repairs are being carried out as quickly as possible. Mr .Mumford was asked about the up to date situation on the mound of earth and he explained that they were going to dig trial pits to see if there is a road surface underneath.

#### **B.CARSON**

A meeting is to be held between South Hams Distrct Council and local parishes in areas where affordable housing sites are planned, mainly Salcombe and Kingsbridge.

He outlined what the costs of beach management was i.e. lifeguards, signage, lifebuoys, beach rescue equipment. In some areas money from car parking helps but the remainder comes from council tax. The Standards Committee have agreed, if required, for the Standard's solicitor to offer training to parish councils. He suggested that Ringmore, Bigbury and Kingston might join together for this.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL MATTERS

Cllr.Deverson will chase Devon County regarding the work still to be done down Darkie Lane.

#### PARISH PLAN

Ringmore Newsletter – The self funding of the newsletter is now in a satisfactory state, the £200 that was given by the Parish Council in October 2008 has been returned. The editorial team wish to make it known the only monies taken from the Parish Council are for the space it charges for the printing of the minutes each month, this is at the same rate that other parish organisations are requested to contribute.

The items on the revised action plan list were discussed some of them are still ongoing and some were deleted. A new action plan will be produced.

This will be attached to the May newsletter.

#### BOUNDARY STONES

After a lengthy discussion it was unanimously agreed that the village master stone by the bus shelter should be a much smaller one with a bronze plaque showing the Parish Boundary and where the stones have been placed. Parish Council have been asked whether the stones can be covered under their liability insurance.

# Solutional Trust


