

TIME TO SERVE

The Government wants us to express our views on the A.V. Time was when these letters referred to the Authorised Version of the Bible, which celebrates its 400th anniversary this year, and stands unique in English literature. For many, the A.V. is still the authentic language of Christianity; for others, it is the first in a long line of translations seeking to present God's message in everyday language.

But the Government has something rather different in mind. How will we elect our politicians in future – FPTP (first past the post) or AV (alternative vote)? The referendum is on 5 May, and it certainly is not my place to comment on which way to vote!

The crucial thing about any election, whether Parliament or PCC, is that those who are elected represent the whole electorate, not just those who voted for them. That means acting in the interests of all, and championing the needs of the minority. It is when people feel that their elected leaders don't care about them that trouble starts. Power has to be exercised for the common good – and certainly not for personal gain.

We elect people to serve in various capacities. Indeed, the word "minister" means "servant", and clergy are servants of Jesus Christ called to specific (and onerous!) work. Ministers of the Crown are servants of the people. ("Prime Minister" actually means "Chief Servant", although I suspect that David Cameron would rather not change the title!)

The idea of service runs right through our society from top to bottom; we rely on each other for the goods and services which we need. We may not think of it in such terms, but serving each other is fundamental to our enjoyment. For Christians, this finds its ultimate in the way we serve God, for the other side of that coin is the way God blesses us.

So whichever way we vote on 5 May, let's make sure our own lives reflect a loving concern for others, and a new willingness to serve God and our fellow men and women.

The Rector writes...



NATI ONAL TRUST



With the fantastic weather South Devon has been having over the last couple of weeks, it seems as though summer is well and truly on its way. It highlights just how stunning the coast is in this area, and how important it is that people are able to get out and about to appreciate it! Over the last month the Rangers have been busy beginning to make preparations for the summer season; footpath cutting and making preparations at the car parks.

On the 2 for April, the rangers held a beach clean at Ayrmer cove, Ringmore. A group of keen local people joined us for the morning, it was great to talk to the local residents and see just how much Ayrmer is loved by the people who regularly use it. The morning was part of a South West beach clean event run by the National Trust to understand what sort of litter is found on our beaches; whether it is from passing ships, fishing vessels or people on the beach. We managed to collect a large amount of information which will be added to the Marine Conservation Society countrywide database. I would like to take this opportunity to say thank you to all those who joined us.

Over the past few years the ponds at Scobbiscombe Farm have been part of a nationwide chytridiomycosis survey. This disease is believed to be responsible for the decline of newts and toads in North America and Australia. Last week, the pond at Scobbiscombe was re-surveyed in order to enable scientists to better understand the nature of the disease. Over the space of a couple of hours, with nets in hand, we attempted to catch as many newts and toads as we could find so they could be swabbed to see if they carried the disease. After an afternoon of hunting we only managed to find 13 out of the 30 desired newts, but these results will still play an important part of the survey.

With the weather improving and the sun shining, I hope to see you out and about enjoying the breath taking views along this wonderful section of coastline.


