

raise and strengthen you, that you may transform the world"



Its pitch black when you get up and dark when you get home, and if you are like me, it will now be a struggle to wake and get going in the morning. But once you are up and about the winter mornings bring a breath of fresh air preparing you for the day ahead so put on your winter woollies, get outside and enjoy.

The ranger team have been very busy over at Ringmore Orchard, cutting back the footpath and around the apple trees in preparation for a team of volunteers from

Ringmore led by National Trust volunteer ranger John Reynolds to start work on the Orchard project. John has organised a community group that will regularly work at the Orchard carrying out any maintenance work and improvements that will restore the orchard and enable the trees to grow and flourish. Recently John and his team have been up at the Orchard removing the tree guards and cutting back the overgrown vegetation. The hard work by this team to reclaim the Orchard is much appreciated by the rangers and will hopefully encourage more people to visit the site.

Trueways Survival are undertaking a three day survival course at Ayrmer Cove running from Friday 4th to Sunday 6th November inclusive. There will be around 15 participants and a course leader. If any issues do arise please contact the ranger team on 01548 562344, or the course leader will be more than happy to talk to visitors whilst they are down at the cove.

There are still chances to get stuck in this winter with the National Trust countryside skills workshops. Saturday 19th & Sunday 20th November 10am - 4pm Wembury



SAUTED APPLES WITH WHISKY AND ORANGE

50g/2oz caster sugar 2 Cox apples, peeled, cored and sliced 1 vanilla pad, seeds scraped out 1 orange, zest and juice only Splash of whisky 50g/2oz sultanas

Heat the sugar, apples slices and vanilla seeds in a frying pan over a medium heat until caramelised. Add the orange zest and juice, whiskey and sultanas and simmer for a few minutes, until the apple is softened

To serve, place apples onto a plate with a dollop of Greek yoghurt or cream and a sprig of mint to garnish.



AYRMER WOOD ORCHARD PROJECT

On Sunday 16th March, National Trust ranger Marc Hoskins, accompanied by a team of Ringmore volunteers, made a start on the project to restore and reclaim the Orchard situated just off the permissive footpath that wends it's way up through the wood across the valley from Lower Manor Farm. The Orchard was apparently planted early in the last decade with a variety of fruit trees, including some

SECOND TIME ROUND THE YEW TREE

10 AUGUST 2011

Once again, fair weather provided the setting for the quinquennial event of measuring the fine English Yew in the All Hallows' churchyard. Over forty people came to enjoy a glass of wine in the sunshine and keep an eye on the two or three of us who circumnavigated the mighty tree several times, exercising fierce concentration in order to get everything right. Preparations for the event had started well before the actual day, as people who regularly walk the path through the graveyard will testify, a number having come across me pinning strings on the tree, or frowning at my sums on a piece of paper that the wind was constantly wrenching from my grasp. Perhaps they wondered why the preparations were taking so long.

I had come across a snag: the markers put on the tree in 2006 had not survived five years of weathering. But before despair set in I remembered that at home I had photographs, written measurements, and a garden cane, relevantly marked. Using those statistics, I made new marks using pins. Then, before the Day, and at our 'rehearsal' for it, I made a series of measurements.

None of those measurements proved to be smaller than the 2006 result of a 4.9m girth, so I then derived a medial measurement from them: 4.16m. This meant that there was an increase in girth over the last five years of approximately 7cm. This was a highly credible result, as most old and growing yews will increase their girth by between 5cm and 12cm over five years. After the final measuring, details of the whole procedure were sent to the Ancient Yew Group. And subsequently some very small wooden marker pegs have been put in place to be the basis of future measurings.

The All Hallows yew is strong and healthy, produces arils (its female flowers) in abundance, and shows no signs of decay or decline. However, it is truly tricky to measure because it grows from a rather steep sloping bank, and this means that the height of the main trunk before forking is about 24cm on the tree's north-facing side and between 82cm - 90cm on its south -facing side. Yet the best height for measuring is said to 1.5m! It is also difficult to assess our yew's age, for its position at the head of Ayrmer Cove means that it receives the frequent onslaught of growth-inhibiting sea gales.

The grassy bank on which the yew grows is vestigial. I believe that it was once the boundary of the graveyard and that it was partly smoothed out when the graveyard was extended, leaving the area of bank where the tree grows more or less intact, so that vital roots would not be exposed.

If our yew, like so many churchyard yews, was indeed planted on the graveyard boundary around the time the present church was built, it would date from the fourteenth century and so would be older than its girth now suggests. But if we take into account the growth-inhibiting effects of the sea winds, and the significant fact that most yews have long periods of dormancy between periods of growth, then a greater age is not only possible but also quite likely. However, we must not forget - there is at present no solid evidence for assigning this greater age to our yew. Yet it is a reasonable conjecture, entirely consonant with churchyard traditions and with the known growth-inhibiting effects of harsh weather on the indomitable tree.

The Parish Council considered a suggestion from Devon Highways that double yellow lines be painted from Ringmore Cross to the Journey's End.



OPEN SESSION

Dr.Malcolm Findlay updated the council on the latest developments which have happened since the application for Rock Armour at Challaborough was refused.

The developers are now appealing against the decision and the hearing will be held at Follaton House on the 2nd November at 10am in the Cary Room. If this is rejected the developers are proposing a planning application to use gunite which is sprayed on over metal rods and steel mesh to adhere it to the rock face. This is not very attractive as it is a smooth surface and will leave it open for graffiti etc. and is not a long term solution. It is still not known the real reasons for these measures and a Shoreline Coastal survey has stated that over the long term no considerable erosion will take place.

Dr.Findlay will be attending the hearing and asked council and parishioners for their support. It was agreed that a letter will be sent from parish council expressing our views.

MINUTES OF LAST MEETING - Signed as correct.

MATTERS ARISING

Bus Shelter - Carried forward to the next meeting

Dog Fouling – Parish council agreed to purchase a dog fouling/litter bin subject to its position and access for emptying. Mr.Steve Mason (SHDC) will arrange to visit and agree the position of the bin, together with a parish councillor.

Grit Bins – It has been agreed that two grit bins will be sited at the top and half way down Challaborough Hill. As we have now joined the Snow Warden scheme we are entitled to a bulk supply of salt in 25kg bags, which will be used by the Snow Warden (Cllr.Deverson) together with volunteers for spreading on the roads where needed.

It must be emphasised that the salt is to be used only for the roads and not private paths and driveways. Parish council agreed to review the purchase of a push- along spreader which can be used to scatter salt. Parish Room Sycamore Tree – Item on the agenda for the next meeting.

W.MUMFORD

MrtMumford stated that there is already a 'unsuitable for HGV' sign on the road down to the Journey's End, whowever this matter will be kept under observation.

John Hart, the leader of DCC, will be holding meetings at various locations throughout the county to discuss budgets where parishioners can decide which services they wish to keep and which can go. Plans are now being submitted for the Sherford housing development, taking place on the 7th December. The broadband programme for the area is still on track. There is quite a lot of work taking-place on the roads around the area i.e. drainage and stone walling which may cause possible delays.

B.CARSON

Many of the services are now shared with West Devon which has cut the cost of management. Planning is now shared with Malcolm Elliott overseeing this department. Tor Homes are busy joining forces with Devon and Cornwall Housing.

The Chairman reported that he had completed the Standards Committee's consultation paper on what might replace the current provisions for regulating the conduct of councillors after the review detailed in the Localism Bill.

Mr.Dudley Cave by Cllr.Reynolds.

Nick Colton has now confirmed in writing that a drop drain will be installed in Ringmore Vean. The Chairman raised the matter that parts of the Ringmore to St.Annes Chapel footpath had been ploughed right up to the hedge. After discussion it was established that the farmer had now seeded and this should be restored to normal. FINANCE - Cheques agreed and signed -

B. Cole £511.13 for the October skip in the parish.

At this stage in the meeting ClImReynolds declared a prejudicial interest, A £ 250 donation was agreed as a contribution towards South West Coast Path Partnership. Who are employing the National Trust to move 1000m of fence inland between Ayrmer Cove and Challaborough.

A further 5 year contract was signed with Ken Abraham our internal auditor,

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

The Chairman raised the subject of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee together with a leaflet which had been distributed suggesting that beacons are lit throughout the country. The aim is to light altogether 2012 beacons around the country. He asked councillors to consider ways of celebrating the event in the parish. The Clerk was asked to write to all the organisations in the parish to ask if they were planning any special events.

It was reported that some of our parishioners had commented on the volume of music coming from the Journey's End one Saturday night.

The Clerk reported that due to the lack of use the can bank in Challaborough will be removed.

SALMON POACHING

The salmon poaching season has started already it seems and these single-minded criminals are again compromising the wellbeing of the river and its wildlife.

An AG resident, was out kayaking on the Avon this morning at 9.15am (yes – broad daylight!) and saw two 40(-ish!)- year old men putting out a 150' net just upstream of Milburn Orchard on the incoming tide. Presumably they were after salmon which have started their seasonal run upriver, apparently. The Environment Agency were informed via their 24/7 hotline. Their open boat was a bright blue, outboard-driven, of unknown origin and it is not known whether the men left the river via Bantham or AG (Timbers).

It seems likely that we shall have more of the same if the salmon are running so please keep an eye open and if you see anything suspicious – day or night, report it to both the EA on 0800 807060 (Freephone, 24 hour service) and the police on 08452 777 444.

PLEASE NOTE: WE HAVE BEEN WARNED NOT TO APPROACH THESE PEOPLE UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES; THEY OFTEN OPERATE IN HIGHLY PROFESSIONAL CRIMINAL GANGS AND MAY BE VIOLENT.


RINGMORE NEWSLETTER TOWN QUIZ 2011



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
