"Charity begins at home!"

Some people say that the Church should not get involved in politics (though this doesn't work the other way round, as the marriage debate has shown). But Christians have a fundamental duty before God to help the poor and needy, and that inevitably means being concerned about the effect of legislation. You cannot have austerity without cutbacks, which makes it all the more important that those in greatest need are protected. The idea that it should pay to be in work is good, but with 2.52 million unemployed, many will be unable to find paid work and could easily become trapped in increasing poverty if benefits are restricted. Our Christian leaders are quite right to draw attention to the dangers.

Of course, there are many people telling the government what to do, often demanding funds without considering where the money will come from. Christians should be at the forefront of those aware of individuals in need in their community, and seeking quietly to meet those needs. It is good to see churches running foodbanks and giving to Christian missions working to alleviate need; the Salvation Army and (locally) the Shekinah Mission do excellent work.

True faith is not just about going the church. In the Bible, true religion means looking after those orphaned or widowed (for whom there was no state help), and the early Christians were quick to help their brothers and sisters in need.

"Charity begins at home" we are told (a proverb that was around well before Jesus was born!). But does it also end there? In a time of austerity, you have to cut back, and the natural instinct is to try to maintain your own standard of living. What difference will your private giving make, people might ask? The lovely story is told of the little girl seen throwing stranded starfish back into the sea one by one. "There are thousands there, what difference will you make?" someone sneered. She looked up, a starfish in her hand. "It will make a lot of difference to this one". Let us do what we can, whenever we can, to all we can.

RESIDENTS/RESIDENCES OF THE PARISH OF RINGMORE

Extracted from the memories of Margaret Lock (nee Triggs) and Alice Mason (nee Farley) recorded by Hazel Mackintosh in 1999.



SEAVIEW

Seaview was owned by The Manor but , in 1915, the Village was being sold up and Margaret's Great Uncle David bought it. He was a carpenter and undertaker. His wife was called Ellen. He rather fancied himself and he always had to clear his throat as he went into Church. They had two daughters: Miriam who married an Olver and they had a daughter, Dorothy, and Maude who married farmer Holman and had 3 sons and a daughter. Miriam's husband died when he was young and she then ran the Post Office from the front room of Seaview.

In 1925 Stan and Lily Triggs bought the house from Maude for £500. Margaret, their daughter, was only a baby at the time. In due course, Margaret was married to Eric Lock and they lived in Seaview. They had a son, Michael, and it was pouring with rain on the day he was born. Margaret and Eric lived in Seaview for the rest of their lives. After Eric died in 1993 one of Margaret's grandsons and his young family came to live with her. Following Margaret's recent death, her grandson and family have moved to lvybridge and the house is on the market. It is sad that there are no longer any members of the Triggs family living in Ringmore

Royal British Legion



The Royal British Legion has announced the next stage of plans to implement the biggest organisational change in its 91 year history, with the aim of improving ease of access and delivery of support to its Armed Forces family of beneficiaries.

An earlier first phase, which saw internal structural changes, has been successfully completed. Over the coming months, the Legion will introduce new and improved methods for members of the Armed Forces community to contact the charity and access the support they need.

The changes will see the introduction of a UK-based central contact centre for phone enquiries offering initial support and guidance, an expansion of current online services, and greater access to face-to-face assistance through a new High Street presence improving access in the communities where beneficiaries live and work.

The Royal British Legion's Director General Dr Chris Simpkins said:

"Pathway for Growth is about improving and increasing our services, our profile in communities, the way in which we deliver services and increasing ways in which our beneficiaries can access us for help. The world around us is changing and the Legion must change too.

"Investing in improving our efficiency and the outcomes we deliver for our beneficiaries is long overdue." The Pathway for Growth programme will enable the Legion to achieve its mission and meet the rapidly changing needs of its beneficiaries in challenging times.

Service personnel returning from conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan will be dealing with the trauma and impact of war for years to come, and those who are medically discharged will need specialist care and support. Service leavers are embarking on civilian adult life in the most difficult economic times in recent history and the WWII generation's need for support is currently at its peak. Defence cuts will mean a further reduction in the numbers of regular Serving personnel and a significant increase in reservists.

By introducing these three new 'contact points,' the Legion will be easier to find and more accessible; providing practical support, information and advice when people need it most.

CLEAR Advantages to being prepared for an emergency

A new video and leaflet to help people prepare for an emergency is being launched this week as part of a campaign by the Devon, Cornwall and Isles of Scilly Local Resilience Forum (LRF). The LRF are encouraging people to take a few simple steps to ensure they are better prepared should an emergency occur.

Both the video and the leaflet encourage you to stay safe and have a CLEAR plan by following five easy steps:. • Check the radio, television, social media or internet for weather warnings and news that might warn you that an emergency situation is likely to occur.

Keep a List of important numbers and details (like insurance policy numbers and prescriptions) to hand.

- Have an Emergency Bag prepared with items that would help you
- . Know how and when to Act, should the worst happen,
- . This will all help you to Recover better once the emergency has passed.

The affects of the recent floods have reminded us all of the benefits that taking a few simple steps in advance can have, like keeping important documents in a box up off of the floor, and the leaflet includes more helpful advice along these lines. But the campaign is not limited to helping those who could be affected by flooding. The advice applies to a variety of emergency situations that could cause people to either be confined to their homes or kept out of them for a number of days.

The campaign is being supported with a competition for anyone living in Devon, Cornwall or the Isles of Scilly under the age of 18. Based on the steps in the leaflet and video they are being asked to share their ideas on how to encourage people to prepare for an emergency using photographs or short films. Schools throughout the counties are being written to about the competition and details on how to enter are available on the LRF website along with the prizes. Please encourage schools or youth groups in your parish to get involved.

The LRF brings together experts from the Emergency Services, Local Government and the Health Services, amongst others, to ensure plans are in place to respond to major emergencies, to save lives, contain danger, protect the public and to minimise the effects so we can all return to normality as soon as possible. This campaign reflects the role we all have as individuals to ensure we are as prepared as we can be for an emergency.

Most of us know that the 2012 Olympics entailed the biggest police operation ever mounted in the UK; not all of us have had the opportunity to hear first hand from one of the people actively involved in protecting the competitors. Stephen

Mullen of the Devon and Cornwall Constabulary was one of 500 policemen guarding the events at Weymouth and Portland and he gave us a fascinating insight into the complexity of the proceedings.

43 vessels from many different organisations such as the police, the Navy and even the Border Agency were used to man 85 miles of coastline; they were organised into distinct lines of defence in case any intrusive boat tried to break through the cordon. Any interloper would meet first of all launches filled with volunteers who would ask them to turn back; if they refused the next obstacle would be the police, who with members of the Navy were waiting in RIBs; next came the Marines in landing craft, and the final deterrent would be a helicopter carrying a crew licensed to fire its weapons if need be. As it happened only one person tried to break through – an ex Olympic competitor who decided that he wanted to be part of the action!

After the Olympics came the Paralympics; Stephen was saddened that most of the journalists did not bother to stay for an event that provided outstanding examples of courage and ingenuity. One sailor had no body movement at all, and controlled his boat by means of a blowpipe; many of the helmsmen had to rely on a crew who might be blind but able to the handle the sails

This was a great opportunity to hear a fascinating and unusual talk.

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
