Jackie Tagent welcomed members and several visitors and introduced Mike Rendell, historian and author of the book 'Diary of a Georgian Gentleman', who was the guest speaker at the Ringmore W.I. July meeting.

#### Jesus every day

I was in a shop the other day talking about Jesus to the man behind the counter. Someone from church came in, overheard, and said, 'steady on, it's not Sunday you know?' WRONG! For a Christian EVERY day is Sunday. Every day is a day to talk and think about Jesus. In Matthew 28 Jesus said, 'therefore go and make disciples of all nations'. No mention of only on Sundays.

As Christians we are commanded to take the good news of Jesus out to our communities, through both words and actions. This means <u>us</u>, the wo/man in the pew, not the clergy. The days of the clergy doing everything and the congregation just turning up for an hour once a week, are way behind us. It is up to the practicing, believing, committed Christians in our churches to spend time in prayer finding out what God wants of us and what our communities need. And then – going out and doing it.

Yes, we are going to get it wrong occasionally. Yes, we are going to upset people occasionally. But we have to try. We have to take that step of faith. Doing something and getting it wrong is far better than doing nothing.

In your church, your village, your community; where does the need lie? Children, the elderly, the lonely, single parents, the farming community? In too many churches the question is 'how do we get people to come to church?' The correct question is, 'how do we take Christ out to the community?' If they subsequently come to church, that is a bonus. Church is for believers, we cannot expect non-church families to turn up on Sunday. Once again, those days are way behind us.

It's up to us, as Christ's hands and feet in our communities, to take God's love and care to those who need it. If we are brave enough to do that, then maybe, in the future, our churches will be full of believers.

#### New doorstep crime initiative launched across Devon and Cornwall

A new Devon and Cornwall Doorstep Crime Reduction Partnership was launched on Monday 15 April to help beat bogus callers, rogue traders and distraction burglars.

Devon and Cornwall Police has joined forces with county and district councils' Trading Standards services throughout the region to tackle doorstep criminals. The aim of the partnership is to help prevent residents becoming victims of doorstep crime by raising awareness, particularly among the more vulnerable, and to encourage people to report incidents.

The campaign, which is being supported by BBC local radio and Age UK, is designed to empower people to say No to bogus callers and report any suspicious activity in their local area to the police or Trading Standards.

Traders who refuse to leave someone's doorstep when asked could be committing a criminal offence, and as part of the campaign, residents are being advised on how best to deal with cold callers and stay safe in their homes, as well as given information on how to collect vital evidence to help the police and Trading Standards identify and catch offenders.

Free crime information packs have been distributed to public places such as libraries, doctors' surgeries and police stations across the region. The packs contain information for residents about protecting themselves against being conned by doorstep criminals, such as checking the caller's ID, using a door chain or simply not opening the door if you're not sure who it is, as well as getting a second opinion before agreeing to any work and checking the telephone numbers provided. Residents are urged not to let anyone into their home by a caller whilst an

accomplice enters the house, often at the rear.

It is well established that burglar use common tricks such as asking to check the water, gas or electricity meters.

In particular, households are being encouraged to display the 'No Cold Caller' stickers contained in the packs on their front doors to warn would-be rogue doorstop sellers and cold callers that the occupants are not prepared to do business on the doorstep.

PC Mike Elliot said: "Our continued motivation to protect the people of Devon and Cornwall has developed into a strong partnership across the two counties for the first time.

"We will continue to seek the support of people of all ages in our communities to identify offenders, improve the efficiency and effectiveness of investigations and irradicate this type of crime."

#### Secure your shed and garage

Due to the rise in shed and garage thefts over the summer months, police are encouraging people to undertake simple security measures earlier to help prevent them becoming victims of crime.

Simple tips such as locking sheds and garages and putting expensive items away in secure locations after use are important. Property such as bikes, power tools, lawnmowers, garden furniture or ornaments as well as sporting equipment are sort after items. As people in the UK are spending more and more leisure time in the garden the value of the items within our sheds and garages has risen, making these areas attractive to thieves.

Totnes local neighbourhood team is asking householders to be aware that sheds and garages are locked and garden equipment are secure at all times.

Devon and Cornwall Police are keen to ensure you keep your shed and garage as secure as possible by following the tips below: **Top tips** 

- Locks Fit strong deadlocks or padlocks to shed and garage doors.
- Garden equipment Lock all garden equipment after use in your garage or shed.
- Strong doors Make sure your doors are strong and solid. Use strong door hinges also secured with coach bolts.
- Outside lighting Install outside lighting, possibly low energy security lights.
- Access routes Consider using gravel on paths and driveways. This makes it difficult for people to approach without making a noise to attract attention.

Our team was out for 2 days recently pulling and incinerating the Ragwort on Clematon Hill, Bigbury. It seems to have been a good year for the plant and we have many days of pulling ahead of us. Ragwort is an important plant in the British countryside as it is a food and nectar source for many invertebrates and therefore is only controlled on sites where the plant poses a threat to the health and welfare of grazing animals or the production of hay.

We have a new member to our team; Seasonal Ranger Joel Wakeling who will be out and about undertaking practical tasks to ensure our estate is maintained to a high standard. If you see any of the Rangers out on site please do stop and have a chat.
