
Tearfund Lunches are starting again!

Are Leaders Born or Made?

Leadership in the Church is taking on more significance with the reduction in the number of ordained priests. As clergy have to cover more parishes, there is a growing need for lay men and women who can assist in the leadership of the local church.

Whilst there are techniques and aids to assist people, in the final analysis it is the character of the leader which determines good leadership. Next month in the Modbury Team we begin a series of studies to look more closely at what makes a good leader. The title of the course is "Growing Leaders" and will be particularly useful to PCC members and those involved in any kind of leadership in the Church. The meetings will be in Aveton Gifford Church, generally on the 4th Sunday afternoon of each month, from 3 to 5 pm, and start on 27th October. There is no charge, and no commitment to undertake a particular job at the end of the course. The course is in four parts and, whilst we hope that people will want to attend the whole course, if you are not sure, come along to the first couple of meetings and decide whether this is for you or not. Neil and I will gladly give you more details.

In one sense most (perhaps, all) of us are engaged in leadership of one sort or another. Whenever we meet someone, we influence them by what we say and do, and nobody more so than parents and grandparents. The task of leading a new generation to be good citizens and loving people is a particularly crucial and awesome one. In the Church there are leaders in a variety of positions, whether Sunday worship, home groups or as those responsible for the various rotas which enable churches to run smoothly. Not to mention church officers and council members! To all of you we say a big "thank you". We value your support, and look forward to many others trained and willing to undertake leadership in God's Church.



Seared Scallops with Pureed Cauliflower & Pancetta

12 scallops cleaned and de-roed

4 slices Pancetta Half a cauliflower Half a pint of semi skimmed milk Salt & Pepper to taste

Method:

Place milk and cauliflower in a pan with a good pinch of salt and bring to the boil. Simmer until the cauliflower is tender. Drain the cauliflower from the milk making sure you do not throw away the milk. Puree the cooked cauliflower in a food processor until smooth and add some of the milk if the puree is too thick. Season to taste.

Preheat the oven to 180, place the slices on pancetta between two sheets of baking paper and then between two baking trays, place in oven for 8 minutes. Uncover the pancetta and leave to cool. It will crisp as it cools.

Heat a frying pan until very hot. Season the scallops with salt and pepper and then fry in a drizzle of oil. Cook on each side for two minute until golden brown.

Place three spoonfuls of cauliflower puree on each plate, put the scallops on top and finish the plate with the crispy strips of pancetta and garnish with microcress.

This is one of the Shack's most popular dishes and I hope that you will enjoy cooking and eating it at home.

Baked apple & toffee crumble

EASY 😹

SERVES 6 @ PREP 20 mins plus resting @ COOK 1 hr

FOR THE APPLE LAYER 100g/4oz raisins 100g/4oz pitted soft dates, snipped into small pieces with scissors 85g/3oz light muscovado sugar 3 tbsp dark rum (or use orange juice) 25g/1oz unsaited butter 1 tsp mixed spice zest and juice 1 lemon 4 Bramley apples, about \$00g/1lb 12 oz, peeled, cored and cut into 1cm rings FOR THE CRUMBLE 125g/4%oz plain flour 100g/4oz unsalted butter 50g/2oz light muscovado sugar 3 than jumbo oats 25g/1oz flaked almonds (or use any other nuts you like) custard or ice cream, to serve

1 Heat oven to 190C/170C fan/gas 5. Put. everything for the apple layer, except the lemon juice and applies, into a bowl and microwave on High for 1% mins until the butter has melted and the sugar is syrupy. Toss in the apples and lemon juice, then spoon into a medium baking dish, making sure the dried fruit is evenly distributed. 2 Rub the flour and butter together, first into fine crumbs, then keep going until the mix forms bigger clumps, a bit like a rough biscuit dough. Stir in the sugar, oats and almonds. Scatter over the fruit, then cover with foil and bake for 1 hr, removing the foil for the final 30 mins, until golden and bubbling. Rest for 10 mins, then serve with custard or ice cream.

Well Well Well!

How many wells are there in Ringmore, both those still in commission and those now defunct? Does anybody know? We all know of at least one or two, but it would be interesting to know how many the village has had in the past and how many are still usable.



At Barnford there is one in the shed by the back gate and this has several unusual features; perhaps previous owners have written about it. There is still a big cast iron hand pump in the shed, although this is both rather inaccessible and appears to be rusted solid and doesn't work any more. The previous owners of Barnford installed an electric pump to enable water to be used for gardening, but the water quality wasn't good enough for drinking even before a torch was dropped down it! Perhaps, as an elderly neighbour once observed to us years ago regarding a well at Church Cottage, our thatched cottage in Worcestershire, 'There's too much gravy coming down from the churchyard.'

In any event, this summer's dry weather has lowered the water level a long way. I measured it

recently and found that the water was 23 feet (7m) below ground level, but there was still 10 feet (3m) of water at the bottom, so the well is more than 33 feet (10m) deep. As it is obviously quite ancient (well, older than I am, anyway!) it might have quite a bit of silt in it and this might reveal other objects which have dropped down it in the past. Does anyone know how deep it has been in the past, or how old it is, or how low the water might have been in previous dry summers, maybe even 1976? The highest we've ever seen the water level (last December) was 7 feet (2,1m) below ground level.

Although it is only about 3 feet (1m) wide at the bottom, the well is quite wide at the top, over 6 feet (2m) across and actually extends under the shed wall and a little way under the cobbles outside by the road, as well as under the shed floor. The shed wall is supported by an arch which appears to have been added later, presumably when the shed was built, but again we don't know when this was. Most of the way down it appears to have been hewn out of solid rock, which isn't surprising as the Journeys Inn car park is only a few yards away and that was once a quarry.

Does anyone know how to establish the age of a well or know how they were excavated? Quite apart from the problem of digging down below the water level, there is the question of whether the workmen ran out of oxygen when working down there. I daresay I could research much of this on the Internet, but it would be far more interesting to hear from other villagers who have experience of wells.

Have you got any quirky features on your property which the village might be interested to hear about?

A chill is in the air and the leaves are changing colour – autumn is on its way. This time of year sees the transition from our summer work plan to our winter plan. Our team will be busy with woodland management, scrub management and footpath improvements, to name but a few of our winter tasks.

September saw three new Interns join our team: Helen, our Community Ranger Intern, and two Practical Ranger Interns; Chris and Wynona. They will be with our team for 6-9 months, learning skills which will prepare them for paid employment. If you see them out on site make sure you stop and have a chat with them.

Last month footpath improvements were completed over Noss cliffs along Revelstoke Drive. The improvements included scraping off the excess soil from the carriage drive and improving drainage. These works will help to alleviate the problem of the thick mud areas encountered last winter which made sections of the track almost impassable

At the beginning of October we will be improving the footpath at Ayrmer, with a view to resolving the drainage issues that occur near the viewpoint. We will replace a broken section of pipe which runs across the track and also dredge out the small spring water holding-area to ensure that the water flows away from the footpath.

Last but by no means least, a big thank you to the Orchard volunteers. They have done a great job tidying up the orchard; the trees are flourishing with what looks to be a bumper crop this year! We are looking forward to tasting the delicious apple juice.

VILLAGE BOY SAVES DAD'S LIFE!

Our very own Alex (Emily's son) is a hero! Whilst staying with his father, Alex's quick recall of past first aid sessions he attended in Ringmore saved Tim from possible death, stated the Paramedic who attended. Tim returned home from a bike ride feeling "light headed and not well" and wanted to go to his bed. Realising this was not a normal occurrence, Alex insisted his father lay down on the settee so as to remain under his watchful eye. Within minutes of laying down Tim had a violent seizure. The fit ceased but due to the position of his head and neck, he was not breathing. Alex pulled his father to the floor, placed him in the recovery position (thus opening his airway), dialled 999 and called to a passerby through the open window for help.

Tim has made a complete recovery and Alex phoned to thank us for the first aid sessions that probably helped him save his father's life.

A basic first aid session including a defibrillator refresher is to be held on Tuesday 12th November at Bigbury Memorial Hall 7-9pm. *Free* and everyone is welcome.


RINGMORE WI MEETING "LAND'S END TO JOHN O'GROATS" Thursday September 12





